Messrs. S. H. McBratney and P. Yates, members of the I.O.O.F., yesterday attended the funeral of the late H. O. Chisholm at Elgin.

Mr. J. Davis, Chantry, is at Brockville General Hospital, convalescing satisfactorily after being operated upon successfully for appendicitis.

There is a very large yield of raspberries in this section, and the fruit is unusually fine. The first offering brought 8c per lb., but the price is this week down to 5c.

Farmers in this section are just commencing haying, and at the rate that grain is ripening there is a probability that both crops will have to be cared for at the same time.

The High Court of the Independent order of Foresters of this division will meet in Smith's Falls on the 19th and 13th of August. It is expected that about 300 delegates will be present.

Mrs. D. Donovan, of Brockville, was on Monday the guest of Mrs. A. E. Donovan. Her son Roy, who had been visiting Master Jack Donovan for several days, accompanied her home.

The 12th was gloriously celebrated at Smith's Falls on Monday. There was an immense throng of people there, and the Orange procession was an imposing spectacle. About 500 went to the Falls via through train on the B. & W.

The Athens council of the Canadian Order of Chocoma Friends will attend divine service in the Methodist church on Sunday next at 10.30 a.m. Frankville council has been invited to join with them, and any other visiting members will be welcomed.

Among the bills passed at this session of the legislature, was one providing for an optional return to the old system of county councils. By its provisions any county council can, by resolution, decide to return to the old order of things which prevailed some six years ago.

Reports from the blueberry district indicate that the harvest time will be short. There is an average yield, but the berries appear to be all ripening at one time, so there will be but one "picking." Choice berries sell in Athens at \$1.00 per peck, an advance of about 25c over a flush season.

The work of reducing the grade on the Gordon hill, Mill street, has been commenced, a Brockville firm having the work in hand. The council expect to have from 150 to 200 cords of stone taken out, and at the contract price the value of the material blasted out will equal the cost, so that the improving of the hill will be effected at a merely nominal charge.

Mr. Pratt, of Smith's Falls, has purchased Mr. Clare's apiary of 260 colonies at Rideau Ferry. Mr. Clare is one of the most successful apiarists in eastern Ontario, and from his fruit and bees has obtained a snug competency. This fact should encourage our local bee-men to greater efforts. Mr. Clare had four yards, and when at the convention in Athens some years ago said that nearly all his appliances, including the extractor, were of his own manufacture.

At the home of Mrs. C. H. Elliott, Athens, on the 1st inst., Martha McCollam, relict of the late Alexander Elliott, of Chantry, departed this life, aged 83 years. Deceased had been a life-long resident of the homestead at Chantry until about three years ago, when she came to reside with her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Elliott, with whom she lived in quiet comfort and contentment. The funeral took place on the 3rd inst., service being conducted at the house by the Rev. G. N. Simmons, pastor of the Baptist church, of which denomination deceased was a consistent member, and interment took place in the cemetery here.

The Methodist church district meeting and the annual Sunday-school and Epworth League convention will be held at Elgin on Tuesday and Wednesday, August 25 and 26. A good programme is being prepared, and a large attendance is expected of delegates from the Leagues and Sunday schools of the district. Rev. T. J. Mansell, president of the conference, will preside at the district meeting, and Rev. R. Stillwell will conduct the Epworth League proceedings, as president of the District Epworth League.

PARISH OF LANSDOWNE REAR

On Sunday last His Lordship the Bishop of Ontario made his annual visit to this parish. The weather was all that could be desired and the attendance at the several churches the largest in the history of the parish. In the forenoon His Lordship celebrated the Holy Eucharist, administered the rite of confirmation to a class of five young persons, and delivered a most eloquent address at Holy Trinity Church, Lansdowne Rear. The sacred edifice was beautifully decorated by the ladies of the congregation and the service was of a most solemn character.

The choir, under the direction of Miss Elva Green, the organist, rendered the beautiful service of the Eucharist in a most finished manner. The number of communicants was larger than usual—63 having made their communion.

The offerings, which were for the Mission Fund of the Diocese, were of a liberal character.

After lunch, kindly furnished by Mrs. O. Green, His Lordship was driven to St. Paul's Church, Delta, where one of the largest congregations that has ever filled that church awaited his arrival. Evensong was said by the Rector, and the Bishop preached a most eloquent and practical sermon from the text "My beloved is mine and I am his." The ladies of the congregation had the church decorated with palms and cut-flowers, and the old church looked its best.

In the evening service was held at Christ Church, Athens, when, after Evensong, His Lordship admitted a class of eight to the Apostolic rite of laying on of hands, and delivered a most forcible address on the Scriptural origin and importance of that sacred rite. The church was crowded to its fullest capacity, every inch of its seating room being occupied, and the crowd extending to the porch and steps of the building. The music of the choir, under the direction of the organist, Miss M. J. Wright, was of a most artistic character and appropriate to the solemn occasion.

Mr. A. W. Johnston kindly drove His Lordship to the different services during the day in his handsome Surrey after his spirited team. His Lordship left for the mission of Lansdowne Front by train on Monday morning.

The visit of the Bishop of the Diocese was highly appreciated by the people of the Parish. During his visit he was entertained by the Rural Dean at the Rectory.
