What is Going on in Baseball and Other Athletic Games.

News, Local and Telegraphic, Gathered From Reliable Sources.

A friendly game of baseball was played on Tecumseh Park last night between the Bobs and the Chatham colored team. The Bobs won by a score of 11 to 6. The features of the game were McCoy's batting and Smith's work at short.

London, June 27.—Thompson held the London down to two runs yesterday on their own grounds. His pitching was superb. At critical times he was most effective. Hemphill and Hart struck out with men on the bases. Cope and Lohman did about all the timely hitting. Jones reached first on O'Connell's muff in the fourth inning, and went to second while Reed was being retired. Then Cope rapped the ball out to centre, and Lohman sent a liner in the same direction, but with a three-run label attached.

Neal, the slight little fellow who covered left field for the visitors, again did wonderful work. Twice he pulled down long drives by Radcliffe, who was hitting the ball hard every time up, and in the last inning he chased a long fly of Lohman over into the woods and brought it back. Neal's record of six difficult put-outs has not been excelled here. His fine work, quite as much as anything, dampened the spirits of the champions, who had started in chattering like so many magpies. Of the half-dozen catches, that of Radcliffe's bat in the fifth inning was the prettiest.

Hemphill was the subject of a joke that everyone enjoyed but the right-fielder. It happened in the fifth inning. Two hands were gone, and at the moment that Hemphill stole second base Hart struck out. For practice, Klock threw to second to catch Hemphill, but the ball went wild. The Chatham joined in the about, "Go on, go on," and Hemphill sprang for dear life. Not until, breathless, he crossed the plate, did he realize that a good deal of fun was being enjoyed at his expense.

Wiggs pitched for London, and his work was good enough to win any ordinary game. Only seven hits were made off his delivery, and of this number three were by that hard-hitting ex-Londoner Grimshaw. Four of the Chatham six runs were secured on errors. Another was a homer, and the sixth was altogether due to Wiggs, who issued a pass, sandwiched in a wild pitch and then allowed a bounding ball to go through him. Radcliffe's wild throw gave the visitors a run in the second inning. Lohman's passed ball on a third strike cost the runner who scored struck out, but Lohman again let the third strike get away from him. Wiggs seemed to have too much steam up. With three men on bases Wiggs struck out the last man in the third inning, and again in the seventh, with the bases all filled, he struck out the last two men, and so far as his work was concerned the side was retired on strikes.

BOTTLED THEM UP

The Strathconas Have Cut the Boers off From the Sea

By Blowing up a Bridge Near Komati Poort—A Very Effective Stroke.

Pretoria, June 27.—Strathcona's Horse has done one of the great deeds of the war. Leaving Cape Town a month ago, they went to Durban by water, and then proceeded up country, reaching Gen. Buller's force in time to do splendid service in the advance from Newcastle on towards Standerton and Pretoria—service for which they received special mention in Gen. Buller's despatches to the war office, approved by Lord Roberts. Now they have done a deed which will live in history. They have blown up the railway bridge at Komati Poort, on the railway between Pretoria and Koomati Poort, and have cut off all communication of the Boers with the sea. All the Delagoa Bay railway rolling stock, the Boer artillery, the whole Boer army, including the gold taken by President Kruger from the mint here, are west of the break, and must now inevitably fall into our hands. Strathcona's Horse has effectively bottled up the Boers.
