Ten of the ringleaders were arrested and are now in jail. Probably the plot was part of a conspiracy, of which the attempted rising at Johannesburg was the first indication. JUNIOR LEAVING. TIME TO CHANGE.

Results of the Late Departmental Examinations. Chattham Said to Have a Reputation For Meanness

The Education Department has issued the results of part I, junior leaving or public school leaving examinations, of the commercial examinations, of the commercial diploma, part II, examinations, and of the commercial specialists' examinations, held in July last. In the part I, junior leaving lists that follow, the symbol P (5) indicates that the candidates referred to have passed in all the five subjects of the examination, while the symbol P (3) implies that the candidates referred to have passed in grammar, arithmetic and history. Certificates and statements of marks will be forwarded to principals and inspectors—in no case to candidates—within ten days. The results of the other July examinations will probably be issued toward the end of next week.
