G. O. I. COMPETITIONS

Rules governing the competition for prizes in essay writing, elocution and public speaking, a good one, was as follows:—

1. All candidates for the essay prizes will write in the G. O. I. Hall on one of a list of subjects to be prescribed on the day of the competition, Monday, April 7, at 1:30 p. m.

The essay shall be from two to five foolscap pages in length.

Fifty per cent of the value of the essay will be given for the thoughts and their effective arrangement, and fifty per cent for choice of language and grammatical accuracy.

There will be a prize for Forms 1A and 1B, one for 2A and 2B, a third for 3A and 3B, and a fourth for Form A.

2. Each candidate for the elocution prizes will recite a selection of his or her own choice in the Assembly Hall before the school and the judges.

Quality of voice, distinctness of articulation, modulation, emphasis, action, deportment, feeling and gesture, will be the main points considered.

There will be four prizes awarded, three active of Forms. Date: Tuesday, April 8.

3. Each candidate for the silver medal for public speaking will deliver an address on a subject of his or her own choice, in the hall, on Tuesday afternoon, April 8. Each address is to occupy about ten minutes in length.

The judges will be the donors of the prizes: Messrs. J. E. Thomas, T. Scullard, E. Bell, J. W. White and Judge Bell, together with Rev. Dr. Battaly and Rev. Father James, O. I. trustees.
