A GOOD EXAMPLE

Pittsburg manufacturers have reached the conclusion that the remedy for the housing shortage in that industrial district is more houses. They are so well convinced of this that they are building the houses themselves. One of them, the United States Steel Corporation, has offered its employees land to build on, a choice of plans drawn by the company's architects and the services of a building organization in putting up houses in accordance with those plans.

The worker who avails himself of the company's offer makes a first payment of 10 per cent, and pays the balance back to the company in monthly installments, the whole cost to the buyers being just equal to the company's cost. The Steel Corporation is helping Pittsburg to grow; it is establishing in the neighborhood of its factories a body of home-owning workers of the kind it needs; it is writing an effective form of insurance against strikes and reducing the labor turnover.

APPEALS FOR ELECTION

JAPANESE CABINET ADOPTS MEASURES

To Relieve the Present Deplorable Financial Condition of That Country.

Tokio, May 28.—(Can. Press).—In view of the panicky condition in Yokohama banking circles yesterday the Cabinet took up for special consideration today, the general economic and financial condition of the country.

It was decided in order to prevent any aggravation of the situation, to adopt measures to ease the money market through modifying the loan restrictions of the Bank of Japan, and to do everything possible to encourage exports.

Syracuse, N. Y., May 28.—Weed's Incorporated, Binghamton clothiers tried in United States court here under Justice Martin T. Manton, were found guilty this morning on all of eight counts in a Federal indictment charging them with profiteering. The court imposed a fine of \$31,000 upon the firm.

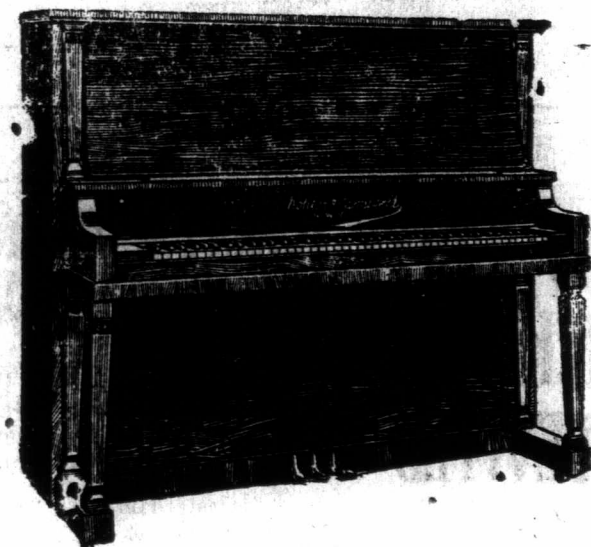

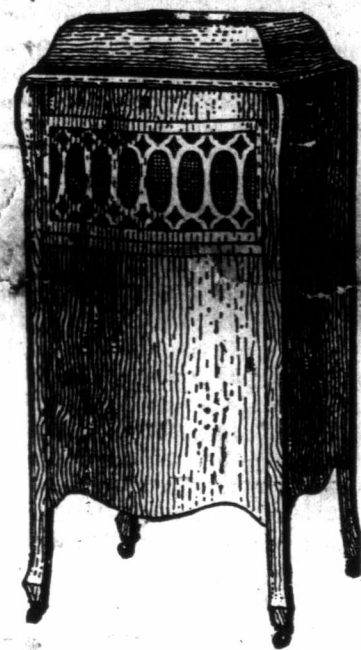

INDIAN STRIKERS HOLD UP TRAINS

London, May 28.—New disorders in connection with the strike of employees of the Great Peninsula Railway in India are reported in a Bombay dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, which says the number of strikers is more than 20,000. At Matunga station several thousand men gathered yesterday and destroyed the railway telegraph line, stopped trains, forced passengers to alight and did considerable other damage. Refreshment cars were raided and food and drink taken. Police dispersed the crowd after firing blank cartridges, but traffic over the road is being greatly embarrassed.

VANCOUVER WILL HOLD HOLIDAY ON JUNE 3rd

Vancouver, May 28.—Next Thursday, June 3, the King's birthday, will be a statutory holiday. The mayor states that Vancouver stores will be closed all day that day but that they may remain open on Wednesday afternoon preceding. All schools, banks, and other public institutions will be closed all day.

BLYTHE ROGERS ESTATE NEARLY QUARTER MILLION

Vancouver, May 28.—The estate of the late Blythe D. Rogers, president of the B. C. Sugar Refinery, is valued at over \$225,000, practically all of which was bequeathed to his wife. He died on May first, being then 27 years of age.
