Fredericktown Market.

The farmers are busy in the harvest field, consequently the market for produce is well supplied. Prices have undergone very little change since last week. Potatoes, 90 cts per barrel; beef, 6 to 8 cts per lb; mutton, 6 to 7 cts; lamb, 7 to 8 cts; butter, (9-crobed) 17 to 18 cts; milk, 15 to 16 cts; chickens, 34 and 40 cts per pair; squash and pumpkins sell from 8 to 10 cts; sweet corn, (scarce) 12 to 14 cts per dozen; cranberries, 70 to 8 cts per quart; carmelis, 10 to 15 cts per bushel; 24 and 30 cts per bushel; eggs, 16 to 18 cts; cabbage, 5 to 6 cts per head; some newly thrashed straw is in the market and sells very rapidly at 10 to 12 cts per ton. The market for corn market straw readily to have it bound in sheafs or bales. Hay brings \$8 and \$10 per ton. Ales are about 38 to 40 cts per bushel. Apples sell from \$1 to \$2 per barrel. Potatoes, \$2 to \$3.50 per bushel.
