THE TECHNICAL SCHOOL.

Since that day the history of Canada has been one of progress, slow, perhaps at first, but gradually increasing, until to-day it has taken the position which challenges the attention of the world, 'In 1863 there were 3,689 post offices in Canada and now the number is between eleven and twelve thousand. Roughly speaking, six hundred million pieces of mail matter passed through the post offices last year. Canada can send letters at two cents to forty-seven countries, which can do the company of timber.
