A meeting of the lobster packers of the island, and others interested in the industry, was held in the hall over E. Toronto, on Thursday afternoon and evening. The object of the meeting was to consider the proposed regulations regarding the lobster fishery.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Canadian papers which claim that we have had a few more failures here than last year take good care not to inform their readers that American failures in business have risen from 9,804 in 1887 to 12,273 in 1891, and that increase last year was 1,300 in number.

An official announcement from the Imperial authorities confirms the statement already made that the new commercial treaty between the British West Indies and the United States will not discriminate against Canada. It is not because Canadian merchandise is prohibited to do their level best to capture the business of the trade from their American competitors.

The census figures of Newfoundland, just published, are a great disappointment. The increase in the last seven years has only been at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent, while the population of St. John's has decreased by over 2,000. Newfoundland is not affiliated with a National Policy nor a yearning for a six-tion market, neither has she diverted herself from any particular course.

YESTERDAY'S Ottawa advice informs us that the following cabinet appointments have taken place at Ottawa. Mr. Patterson of Essex, Ont., becomes Secretary of State; Hon. Mr. Bovey is transferred to the Department of Militia and Defence; Hon. Mr. Chalmers becomes Minister of Customs and Excise; Mr. Carson assumes the portfolio of Post-master General. These appointments have been favorably received by the independent press, and they will, no doubt, prove to be popular.
