In the year 1853, the then united Counties of Huron, Perth and Bruce berrowed from the Municipal Lean Fund \$500,000, which was invested in stock of the Buffalo, Brantford, and Goderich Railway, which stock became a total loss, and was extinguished on the transfer of the railway to the Buffalo and Eake Huron Railway Company. The County of Perth, at its Reinbuttle from Huron

the railway to the Buffale and Take Ruron Railway 18 the Buffale and Take Ruron Railway Company. The County of Perth, at its separation from Huron and Bruce, assumed \$200,000 of this lean, leaving on Huron and Bruce \$350,000, which is the present neminal amount of the indebtedness of Huron to the Municipal Loan Fund. Huron to the Municipal Loan Fund. Huron has pusetually and henerably paid up its interest and sinking fund, and has now at its credit in sinking fund, and has now at its credit in sinking fund about \$132,000.

The County of Huron does not come before the Government as a suppliant for relief from its just debts. The County has heretofore honorably maintained its credit, and promptly made its payments, and is willing to continue te do so if other municipalities equally able are compelled to do likewise; but having seen that some counties, whose position, both as to the character of their indebtedness and their ability to pay, bears a close analogy to that of the County of Huron, and who have persistently, and herestofore apparently successfully, repudiated their obligations to pay,—have had deputations before the Government asking that their indebtedness either be cancelled altogether or greatly reduced, — the County have thought it but right to firmly protest agains any reduction to municipalities who are well able to pay. There are, no agains any reduction to munic palities who are well able to pay. There are, no doubt, several town municipalities, and perhaps one County,—that of Lunark and Renfrew—whose indebtedness to the and Renirew—whose indeptedness to the fund is greatly in excess of their means of payment, and to whom relief may justly be granted, but with the exceptions above named, the County of Huron feels that no county can justly plead inability to now.

The County of Perth had account a greater beautiful. Only \$1,50 Per Annum in Advance. der the same by-law. The County of Perth has derived a greater benefit from the construction of the Buffalo and Lake Huron: Railway than the County of Huron—has a greater number of miles of that railway pas-ing through its territory, and Stratford, its county town, has been largely built up by that railway. The whole Municipal Loan Fund debt of Perth is \$288,000; that of Iluron \$253,000, and \$88,000 of Perth's indebtedness was mourred for gravel roads within the county, while all but \$8,000 of the debt of Huron was sunk and lost of the debt of Huron was sunk and lost in the aforesaid railway. Huron contracted a separate debt of \$400,000 for its gravel reads, by the issue of its own debentures, upon which the interest and sinking fund have been paid. From this statement of the position of the two counties, we think that it must be evident that Perth is fully as well able to pay as Huron, and justly should be called upon to do se. But, while Huron has honestly and faithfully kept up its payments. Perth has for many years persistently refused to meet its obligations to the fund, and now seeks to be relieved, at the expense of the Province, relieved, at the expense of the Province, from the greater portion of its debt, the annual payments to which would involve

no serious burden of taxation upon that county, the annual payment required from Perth for interest and sinking fund being /elly \$20,560, while Huron has yearly paid towards the liquidation of its indebtedness to this fund \$20,240, besides from \$20,000 to \$40,000 annually on its gravel road debentures. Huron is willing to continue its payments until the debt is liquidated, if payment is also enforced from Ferth, and other municipalities in a similar position, whose ability to nay cannot be questioned. palities in a similar position, whose ability to pay cannot be questioned.

Should the Government hink it just, however, that Perth should be relieved of its indebt dness incurved for the Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway, on the ground of that being a work of Provincial importance, then Huron is certainly in justice entitled to a return of the moneys paid on its loan contracted for the same work. The deputation feel convinced that the Government could never so far sanction and reward a course of repudiation, as to relieve the County of repudiation, as to relieve the County of Perth and refuse a reimbursement to Huron. The deputation think it un-necessary to enlarge more upon this point, as such a course weuld be a direct

point, as such a course would be an encourage other municipalities to follow the example set, if that example were to the example set, if that example were to receive the anoton of endorsation of the Government of the Province.

During the interview with you, the deputation were honored with to-day, they gethered from your remarks, that the deputation lately before you from the town of Goderich, had suggested the propriety of the Government assuming the settlement of a claim which the town of Gederich has preferred against the County for the purchase or assumption by the County of a road known as the Northern Graval road, in which the town had invested a portion of the money borrowed by that municipality from the Municipal Loan Fund. The deputation are fully satisfied that the dovernment will clearly see the impropriety and injustice of interfering in any way, by legislation or government action, to arbitrarily compal the County to assume any portion of the indebtedness of the town, against the will of the rate-payers of the County. Without entering at all into the merits of the claim of the town of Goderich, it is sufficient to ing at all into the merits of the claim of the town of Goderich, it is sufficient to say that whatever is just and right in the matter will, no doubt, be done by the County, and in anticipation of, and as an introduction to a final and satisfactory settlement of the claims of the town, the County Council did at its last sitting in 1872, assume for the present year, the maintenance and repairs of the said road, and agreed to pay to the town the sum of \$2,000, as representing the interest for the year of the amount claimed by the town for the road. We mention this simply to show that the County is inclined to do what is right in the matter, but we must competifully but
