'Elector' Replies

Editor Evening Telegram.
Sir,—Your correspondents "Voter" and "Trinitarian" have different opinions as to my identity.

This is, however, a matter of no moment compared to the question under discussion.

"Trinitarian" has dropped the "disappointed" from his non-de-plume, so I presume he has wisely dropped "disappointment" as an argument in favor of the Spur Line.

Since "Trinitarian" alludes so particularly to Trinity East, I have made some enquiries and find that the majority of schooners there get their supplies from St. John's, not Trinity, in the Spring, and most of them frequently sell their fish there also in the Fall.

The fact that there have been no business places in Trinity East for 200 years did your correspondent say, and that last Spring Marshall Bros. installed a most up-to-date store there (the like of which is not excelled in Trinity), coupled with the fact that in the "Enterprise" quite recently, a very large advertisement appeared stating that the Commercial Stores (of Trinity) is shortly to open a branch in Port Rexton "to compete for Xmas trade," would surely seem to indicate that the "centre of trade" is not quite as central as it was 200 years ago.

Why should the Commercial Stores build this branch in Port Rexton if the "Fishermen will continue to come" to them in Trinity?

Again, Railway Stations are not being built in Trinity East and Port Rexton because the people particularly asked for them, but because the railway company saw fit to place them there, and the Bonavista people probably will not look at stations on the main branch line in the same light as the building of a brand new Spur Line at a cost of not less than \$50,000 with its (to them) concomitant evils.

Whether the population between Ireland's Eye and Trinity will benefit by the train going any nearer Trinity than Gott's Cove is to me an open question.

If Trinity gets its Spur, how much more shall we think of Ellenton with its lack of harbor, its 700 inhabitants, its fairly large trade, and its station five miles from the town!

One thing is certain, and that is that the railway company do not view the present or future prospects of Trinity

Man Stabbed

ON THE S. S. BENEDICK.

Frank Borne, a sailor on the S. S. Benedick, was stabbed by Benec Diaz, fireman on the same ship, about 10:35 last night, shortly after they had arrived on board. Diaz, who is a Spaniard, is now held for attempted murder. Borne is lying at the Hospital in a critical condition. The two men with others had been drinking hard on shore during the evening. When they returned to the steamer Borne entered the forecastle on the fireman's side of the ship. The Spaniard tried to prevent him and angry words followed resulting in a fight. Diaz drew a sheath knife and stabbed Borne in the abdomen. Some of the crew now interfered; they prevented the Spaniard from using the knife again and went to the relief of the sailor who had fallen on the forecastle floor. The police were called to Harvey's wharf, and Constables Power and Frampton went on board and arrested the fireman. Dr. Anderson also was called and giving temporary relief to the sailor had him taken to the Hospital in the ambulance. Inspector Sullivan was quickly on the scene and assisted by Supt. Grimes went to the Hospital and took a statement from Borne in presence of the man who is accused of stabbing him.

Arrested for Fraud.

Yesterday forenoon a man named King, of the schooner Abendigo, of Bonaventure, T. B., was arrested by the police and charged with the defrauding of Bowring Bros., exclusive reference to which was made in the Telegram yesterday. A warrant has also been issued for the tallyman, Keats, and he was apprehended on Water Street last night at 7:30 and brought to the station. As far as can be learned the belief is that the two men agreed to have more fish tallied on the board than King really landed and that they were to divide the cash thus received in connection with the fraudulent transaction between them. Mr. Crocker, the Tallyman, and Mr. Bowring were at the Court House yesterday and made a deposition. We learn from Bowring Bros. that they consider they were defrauded of about 20 qts. of fish. The matter is being thoroughly investigated, and both men will appear in court to-day.

He was working on a ladder when he fell to the ground a distance of 15 feet and was seriously hurt about the back, and his kidneys were affected.
