MARTIN LUTHER born 1483. He was educated for the law, but his deep religious convictions prompted him to retire to the cloister to study the Scriptures, after which he began to lecture on theology and was soon known for the strength of his opinions.

OLIVER GOLDSMITH born 1728. His poetical works are limited, but they are exquisite in their kind; he is one of the pioneers who broke down the artificial barriers which convention had erected against a natural literature. "The Traveller" and the "Deserted Village" belong to the highest order of descriptive poetry. He was enriched by his irregular and careless habits, and his generous disposition, kept him in perpetual embarrassment.

SCHILLER born 1759. German poet and one of the most sympathetic figures in literature. A man of singular purity of character, with a mind ambitious of reaching the highest, he strove, in spite of bodily weakness and the frowns of fortune, to attain the ideal in life and art.

The End of the Contest.

WHAT OF THE FUTURE?

On Saturday we drew attention to the extraordinary anomaly which the results of the election presents. At the time we wrote the article, we had not the result of the polling in Fortune Bay at hand. The return of the Hon. C. H. Emerson modifies the figures slightly, but does not alter their general effect, which shows that the majority of voters and the majority of votes cast were substantially in favor of the Opposition Party, although the Opposition have a minority of members returned to the House of Assembly. From this, it is clear that the Government has sustained a serious rebuff at the hands of the people. Practically they have been beaten at the polls.

And Badly Beaten.

for without reckoning St. Barbe, the voters have recorded over 9,800 votes for their opponents than for them. They have lost the Districts of Bona-

vista, Trinity, Port de Grave, and a seat in Bay de Verde. Two Ministers, Messrs. Morison and Blandford, and Mr. Warren, their Speaker, have been defeated. Some of the worst elements in the Government Party have, however, been returned again, and this is the most regrettable feature of the election, for a premium has been placed on boodle and public plunder. The Government relied on the power of falsehood and conscienceless wealth to deceive the people, assassinate the Liberal Party and defeat Justice. They have succeeded in returning a majority of members to the House of Assembly. The power of money, private and public, the examples of graft, and the Tammany methods that have been in operation during the past four years, have shattered the foundations of Responsible Government in the Colony. For four years past the Government of this Colony has been

A Disgrace and a Bye-Word.

Graft, boodle and plunder of the public resources were fully exposed to public view, and it is almost inconceivable that a majority of Tory members should have been returned after the exposure of such a condition of affairs.

The large Protestant Districts may congratulate themselves, and must be congratulated by all honest and intelligent people, for having registered their protest in no uncertain manner, against the past conduct of the

Government, and marked an overwhelming vote against the continuance of the Government in power. On the other hand, it is a matter for regret that the majority of our Roman Catholic friends did not rise to the occasion of their duty to the State. They have

In no Unmistakable Manner

signified their desire for things as they are, and have made themselves responsible for whatever the future may reveal. At the previous election of 1909, their straight vote for the Morris Government might have been expected. The resignation of the Liberal Government had enabled Governor McGregor to place Sir Edward Morris at the head of a temporary Government, and when a General Election took place a few weeks later, it was perhaps not unnatural that the great majority of his coreligionists should make up their minds to try and keep him there. But in view of the scandalous mismanagement of the country's affairs during the past four years, and of the disgrace and difficulty into which the country has been plunged, it is to be deplored that higher motives than power and position did not influence this vote. We are prepared to admit that the disgraceful sectarian tactics practised in the District of St. John's East, in Placentia Bay and elsewhere, and here we call attention to the protest which we publish to-day from Mr. Broaders, a Roman Catholic, who is Vice-President of the F.P.U., had something to do

in the country. But these were only special means towards a common end, and that end was to keep Sir Edward Morris in power, even at the cost of the best interests of the country.

Mr. Morison, Minister of Justice, has been very properly punished by a Protestant District for his connection with the Crown Lands scandals. Sir Edward deserved no less punishment, for he protected, excused and condoned the transgressions of Mr. Morison after Mr. Morison had admitted the facts on which the Memorials were based. Sir Edward Morris also denied having "any interest whatever, direct or indirect in the timber lands of the country," until we produced the certificates of the Registrar of Deeds and proved him to be the holder of forty thousand shares in the St. George's Lumber Company.
