THE MONROE DOCTRINE.

The Monroe doctrine is an invisible line fence which was erected in 1823 to prevent the South American republics from being sold at public auction. in a dark, well ventilated room and needs some new barbed wire and a all night without awakening. few stout posts, particularly along the Mexican border.

The Monroe doctrine is one of the most useful articles which Congress has in its possession. Whenever a tout-lunged filibuster is in progress in the Senate and the speaker has run out of public documents, fearless editorials and extracts from the North American Review, he is always able o piece out a two-day oration with a pedigree of the Monroe doctrine and a burst of defiance to the world powers. A great many senators who otherwise would not know this doctrine from Lincoln's address at Gettysburg are thus able to locate it without hunting dia. Some of the best speeches ever made in Congress have been those which began with a denunciation of the pork barrel and wound up thirtysix hours later with an impassioned map in bas-relief of the Monroe docrine, leaving the opposition scattered around on settees in a state of de-

noralized dishabille. It is likely that this country will deend the Monroe doctrine so long as here is any of it left. It is a part of our life insurance policy, and has no eash surrender value.


