A BY-LAW to provide for the erection of a building reguired to give increased Market House and Town Hall accommodation in the Town of Guelph, and for the issue of eighteen thousand doltars debentures for that purpose.

WHEREAS, increased Market House and Town Hall accommodation is required by the Corporation of the Town of Guelph, and in order to provide for the erection of the necessary building for the said purpose on the Market Square, in the Town of Guelph, and on land belonging to the said Corporation, and to be attached to the present Market House and Town Hall, the said Corporation will require to expend the sum of eighteen thousand dollars.

AND WHEREAS, it is necessary and expedient for the said Corporation to larise by way of loan, the said sum of eighteen thousand dollars, required to be expended as aforesaid, and to create a debt of eighteen thousand dollars for the said purpose.

AND WHEREAS, it will require an

AND WHEREAS, the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality of the Town of Guelph, irrespective of any future increase thereof, and irrespective of any interest, or dividends, or returns from the said work, and also irrespective of any interest from the temporary investment of the sinking fund or principal money to be raised hereunder, or any part thereof, was according to the last revised Assessment Roll, \$2,099,100.

AND WHEREAS, the existing debt including debentures issued for municipal on the said and nine dollars, and for interest the sum of nil dollars.

4th. THAT the said debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of six per cent, per annum from the date thereof, and the same shall be payable half yearly.
