

The Debate on the Address. We have no room to give a full report of the debate on the Address, and it is quite unnecessary, as the objections taken to it by Messrs. Rykert, Lauder and Boulbee can be summed up in a few words.

Mr. Sinclair moved the adoption of the address in a sensible speech. He gave the Government all due credit for the excellent measures it had carried, and for the wise policy it had pursued in the distribution of the surplus, and in aiding railway enterprises.

Mr. Rykert after complaining that the speech provided such a meagre bill of fare, and after expressing the opinion that there was no necessity for increased representation, got on to the old story about the surplus. He denied that he had ever said there were only \$18 in the Treasury, and enquired very anxiously what the surplus really was.

Mr. Rykert has moved for a Committee to inquire into the charges made against him at the Wallace town meeting in July last, by Mr. McKellar. We have some wonderful revelations in prospect.

The Conservatives of South Huron have nominated Mr. Greenway in opposition to Mr. M. C. Cameron. Thus the fight will be between the same parties as was last January.

A despatch to the Pall Mall Gazette on Friday afternoon, announcing that Her Majesty was quite well, and would leave Baltimore the next morning for Windsor, effectually disposes of the story of her death.

Owing to a clause in the Act which makes provision for unforeseen delays in appointing nomination day, it appears the Returning Officer, under such circumstances, is authorized to name a day other than that determined upon at the time of the issue of the writ.

Induction of the Rev. Lachlan Cameron at Thamesford. The Presbytery of London met in Thamesford on Tuesday, the 10th inst., for the purpose of inducing the Rev. Lachlan Cameron, formerly of Acton, into the pastoral charge of the Presbyterian congregation at Thamesford.

After the Presbytery had been duly constituted, the Rev. Neil McKinnon, of Belmont, acting as Moderator, the Rev. G. Munroe, of Embro, preached a suitable and impressive sermon.

Mr. McKinnon then treated the steps taken by the congregation, which ended in Mr. Cameron's acceptance of the call, after which the usual questions having been put and answered, the Moderator, by solemn prayer, inducted Mr. Cameron into the pastoral charge with all the privileges connected therewith.

MONTREAL, Noon, Nov. 14. The latest political rumor is that Hon. L. F. Huntingdon will contest Montreal West against Tom Wente, Macleuzie and Stephens, retiring. It is reported that a clerk employed in the Ottawa branch of the Mercantile Bank has absconded with \$80,000, and gone to Europe.

The meter delivery system inaugurated in connection with the Post Office has continued to work very satisfactorily. Several carriers have been guilty of misconduct, but they have been immediately discharged on so offending.
