Mr. Wilson, in defense of himself said: "I was invited to this reception. I had heard of Peter Jackson, and that he had talked with kings, queens, lawyers and doctors, and I was informed that some of the best people in this city would be present. I went."

The president of the club told me he wanted me to make a speech of welcome, and I refused. He persisted, and I consented. I told Jackson that he had achieved great success in his line, which was somewhat different from mine."

(Laughter.) It was finally voted that Rev. Mr. Wilson be merely told of his error, and that his action was taken amid much laughter and applause.

THE TURF.

SURKOOT WINS THE TWO THOUSAND.

LONDON, April 30.—The Newmarket first spring meeting opened today. The chief event was the race for the two thousand guineas stakes, for 3-year-olds, 100 sovereigns each, half forfeit, over the Rowley mile (one mile and seventeen yards). Three Derby candidates, each carrying 120 pounds, got the places. A. W. Merry's Surefoot, by Galopin, dam by Wisdom, out of Miss Foote, was first; Baron Rothschild's Le Nord, by Tristan-La Noc, second, and the Duke of Westminster's Blue Green, by Ceruleus—Angelica, third.

The race for the Hastings Plate of 500 sovereigns over the Ditch Mile, for 3-year-olds, was won by Baron de Rothschild's chestnut colt Heame, by Hermit—Bella, with Mr. Abington's brown colt Hackler, by Pegasus—Hackney, second; and Mr. J. White's Australian-bred Kirkham, by Chester—La Princesse, third. There were twelve starters.

CANADIAN HORSES SHOW.

At the Boston horse show last week Maud and Excellence, owned by Moorehouse & Pepper, of Toronto, and Bud, owned by S. S. Howland, of Mount Morris, N. Y., were the competitors in the high jump.

All cleared the bar at 6 ft. 3 in., and Maud and Bud cleared it at 6 ft. 4 in., but Excellence failed. The prize, \$150, was divided between Maud and Bud. Maud was sold to Moorehouse & Pepper by John Fulcher, of this city. Among seven competitors in the class for hunters up to carrying 180 pounds, first prize was won by Moorehouse & Pepper's 4-year-old brown gelding Alberta. First prize to half-breds up to carrying 160 pounds went to The Dean, by Terror, shown by Jas. McVey, of Montreal.

J. T. Barlow, F. A. Cole, Jersey City, and b. m. Manin B, alleged to be Fannie C, ordered that Barlow, Cole and the mare be expelled.

Ed. Stoddard, of Portsmouth, N. H., and ch. g. Hazard, horse and man suspended until the case is further notified.

A. P. Burkhardt, Danville, relief of b. m. Confederate Maid from the effect of an alleged "no time" race at Penn Yan, May 23, 1888. Case not proven and was dismissed.

A. Church, Theresa, N. Y., J. M. Allen, Kingston, Ont., and the b. g. Fog Allen, Tom Allen, ordered that the horse and Allen be expelled.

STILL THEY COME.

FIRE APPARATUS.

Number Three Committee Recommends The Purchase of a Truck.

By 8 o'clock last evening that part of the municipal machine known as No. 3 Committee was set in motion and transacted about the usual amount of business.

Chairman Boyd presided, and round the table were Alds. Bartlett, Wallace, Heaman and Fitzgerald, Chief Roe, Electrician Crawford, Engineer Tracy, Inspectors Bell and Hueston, Market Clerk Wilson and Secretary Graydon. A bench at the end of the room held the "public" who had grievances, and as the latter were dealt with one by one the "public" decreased in the same ratio.

Inspector Bell presented his report, showing the amount of license fees collected as reported March 19, to be \$1,166 50, amount collected since \$368, total collected up to date \$1,534 50. Filed.

Mr. John Mullin, wood clerk, reported that he had measured 496 cords of wood during March, and had received \$24 80 as market fees. Filed.

Street Inspector Hueston presented his report, calling attention to some needed repairs to the watering carts. The report was filed and the matter was referred to the Engineer and Ald. Bartlett.

Ald. Fitzgerald moved that Engineer Tracy and Chief Roe be instructed to prepare plans for a new style of watering cart. Carried.

COMMUNICATIONS.

From Mrs. McCue, asking remission of a stall in the Bazar, owing to her inability to pay the same. She is about \$16 in arrears. Filed.

From Ball Electric Light Company, agreeing to extending their street lighting contract for six months. Filed.

From A. R. Murdoch, asking for a space in the market at \$1 per month. It was decided to let him have the place at \$15 a year provided he paid a year in advance.

From Mrs. Hines, a tenant of the Bazar, asking for an extension of the time in order to pay her rent. Granted.

From A. D. Green and others, asking for street watering on Burwell street between Bathurst and Dundas streets. It was decided to have the street watered as far as the north side of the track.

From D. Smith and others, asking for watering Stanley street, South London. Referred to the Chairman and Engineer with power.

Mr. Maurice Baldwin interrupted with the suggestion that the street be scraped before it was watered.

ABOUT RED TAPE.

The matter of Mr. P. O'Meara, hackman, who claims reparation for loss of time and expense, owing to his being ordered off the stand, was taken up. Inspector Bell said the difficulty lay with the Chief of Police, that officer not having granted the proper certificate. Mr. O'Meara had a license at the time of his difficulty, and should not have been interfered with. He was of the opinion that there was too much red tape about the business. He was kept busy all summer collecting licenses owing to the negligence of the Police Commissioner.

Ald. Wallace—The Chief should be made to pay the money himself.

Mr. O'Meara complained very much against the record received and received, protested against having the matter referred again to the police.

Ald. Fitzgerald—If the Chief of Police has committed an illegal act he should be made to pay for it.

It was decided to put the case in the hands of Ald. Fitzgerald to report at next meeting.

Mr. Maurice Baldwin then electrified the committee with one of his forcible speeches relative to his being deprived of \$10 50 wages. He said that his cart had been taken away from him yesterday, and he claimed wages for the time it was gone. The matter was referred to Ald. Fitzgerald and Wallace and Engineer Tracy.

GENERAL BUSINESS.

Application was read from Mr. Joseph Reeves asking for the position as foreman of the fire station in South London. It was laid over until the members from the new ward estates had been elected to the Council.

The disposal of the sore horse at the East London fire station was left in the hands of Ald. Boyd and Chief Roe.

A bill was presented for the Police Commissioners for printing certificates, but was referred and handed back.

The usual accounts were passed and ordered paid, included some for patching up the fire station and other repairs in connection therewith. The members were all of the opinion that the sooner the city got out of the bazar business the better.

INCREASED FIRE PROTECTION.

Chairman Boyd opened up the question of increasing the hook-ladder truck for the fire department. He was of the opinion that the purchase should be made. The matter had been put off for the last eight years and it was not wise to continue such a practice. The first fire in one of the large hotels would convince any one of its necessity.

Ald. Wallace asked what the cost would be for the complete truck.

Chairman Boyd—About \$3,000.

Ald. Wallace—Well, then, I shall vote against it. I tell you right from the first. If you recommend its purchase it is a waste of money.

It was carried that the Council be recommended to purchase a truck in place of the one now in use. Ald. Wallace alone objecting.

DROWNED IN A WELL.

Suicide of a Young Woman at Comber.

WINDSOR, Ont., May 1.—Hermaline Paquin committed suicide at Comber on Saturday night by plunging into a well. Two months ago she went to work at the tailoring establishment of J. J. Gordon, of Comber, to learn the trade, her brother, who lives in Bay City, Mich., promising to pay her board while she was learning. She had another brother working for Gordon, and she worried not a little about the board bill, but he did not think anything strange of it, and told her it would come out all right. On Friday she told him the board bill was to be paid, and when he asked her how, she said he would know by Monday morning. At about 8 o'clock Saturday night the girl went to the well, a short distance from the house, ostensibly to get a drink, and not returning as soon as expected, search was made for her. In less than twenty minutes after she disappeared the tailor, Gordon, fished her apron out of the well, and a few minutes later he hauled up the girl's body. Doctors worked over her several hours, but could not resuscitate her, and she was buried on Monday morning at Tecumseh. Miss Paquin was a handsome, refined girl, 19 years of age, and educated in the convent at Windsor.

CANADA'S CAPITAL.

Why Not Have a Canadian Commander for the Canadian Militia?—The Jesuits' Estates Question Discussed.

OTTAWA, Wednesday, April 30.

In the House of Commons Mr. Mulock moved the first reading of the bill to repeal the law making it obligatory that the Commander-in-Chief of the Canadian militia should be an officer of the British army, thereby making eligible any Canadian officer for this post. He said it was not an encouraging thing for Canadian officers to find the statute debarring them from the highest position in the service. He did not contend for nativism, but for the removal of disabilities.

Sir Adolphe Caron said such an important question could not at this late date receive consideration, but between now and next session the Government must give consideration to it. The bill was read the first time.

In reply to Mr. Macmillan, Sir John Macdonald said the Government were between now and next session consider the advisability of changing the law under which it was possible for General Laurier to draw mileage from England and back.

The day was mainly devoted to Mr. Charlton's resolution declaring that the Jesuit Estates Act should have been referred to the Supreme Court with a view of settling the question of the constitutional validity of the resolution.

The resolution was moved in amendment to Committee of Supply, a form which at one time of itself marked a want of confidence motion, but the Government have a number of times accepted motions in this form. The resolution as presented by Mr. Charlton was not exactly as he had given notice of it. As originally framed it contained a virtual declaration that the case if referred to the Supreme Court, could not be argued by counsel on either side. This reference was expunged, as also was mention of the law officers of the Crown, to whom, as a matter of fact, a reference was allowed. As presented, therefore, the resolution was a clear and simple declaration of opinion that the Supreme Court should have been called upon to adjudicate. In supporting his motion, Mr. Charlton spoke about an hour and a half, and was clear, forceful and eloquent.

Sir John Thompson's speech in reply to that of Mr. Charlton, was in the main a constitutional argument, but some of its points were clearly wrong, even to the ordinary listener. A notable part of it was his absolute denial of the oft-repeated statement that he had inspired the Governor-General in his reply to the delegates who waited upon him in Quebec asking for the denial of the Jesuit Estates Act. He contended in effect that to allow advice to the Government in advance of their decision in respect of disallowance would be an interference with the independence of the executive and the people, and so limit the application of the principle of responsible Government. This is directly opposed to the view taken by Sir John Macdonald, who yesterday accepted Mr. Blake's suggestion that special provision should be made for reference to a high judicial authority in certain classes of cases of contemplated disallowance.

Mr. Blake depicted the spirit of rancor shown in this agitation. He went over the constitutional features of the question, dealing especially with points in which he believed the Minister of Justice had fallen into error. Coming to the question of policy, he gave many strong reasons why the reference should have been made to a high judicial authority. In this connection he read a telegram sent by him last year to a prominent Ministerialist, and a letter to a well-known member of his own side of the House, advising that high judicial advice should be sought, by preference from the Privy Council, or as a second choice from the Supreme Court, or at least from the law officers of the Crown.

The debate was continued by Messrs. Weldon (Albert), Laurier, Davin, Mills, White (Renfrew), Casey, Fisher, Mulock.

Mr. Dalton McCarthy was absent during nearly the whole day, and filed an appearance only for a few minutes. He did not speak but was on hand for the vote which had nothing of a party complexion. The yeas were Messrs. McCarthy, McNeill, Fyfe, Whitely, McCulla, Wallace, O'Brien, Cartwright, Blake, Charlton, Patterson, Casey, Scrivner, Fisher, Sutherland, Wilson (Elgin), Laty W. Worsfold, Somerville, McMillan, Platt, Innes, Livingston, Barron, McDonald (Huron), Watson, Bowman, McMillan (Huron), Waddie, Brien, Campbell, Rowland and Lang—32 yeas to 130 nays.

The House then went into Committee of Supply on the supplementary estimates and adjourned at 1:45.
