TORONTO, May 5 .- One of the most ani-TORONTO, May 5.—One of the most animated discussions in the experience of the Ministerial Association took place yesterday morning, when Rev. G. H. Sandwell, of Zion Congregational Church, read an essay on "The Liturgical in Public Worship." The essayist handled his subject under two heads—(1) Is a liturgical form of service desirable? and (2) if so, to what exservice desirable? and (2) if so, to what ex tent? The first query he answered untent? The first query he answered unhesitatingly in the affirmative. A minister
was not always in the mood to pray; he

of the modern church Mr. Sandwell
launched a scathing criticism, characterising it as unscriptural rubbish and pictistical
twaddle. "What," asked the speaker,
can be less conducive to devotion and revercan be less conducive to devotion and rev ence than to hear a young lady of 20 screaming "Where Is My Boy To-night?" And who can imagine the disciples and the And who can imagine the disciples and the multitudes surrounding our Saviour on the shores of Galilee and shouting, "Hold the Fort," or screeching "Shall We Meet Beyond the River," In conclusion the speaker said though brought up in the Episcopal Church, he could not endure the unchanging repetition of the English service Sunday after Sunday; but he did urge very earnestly some acceptance of liturgical forms, which in his opinion would add materially to the beauty, devotion and value of the services.
