HIGH WINDS, FINE.

TORONTO, March 17—11 a.m.—Generally low pressure prevails over the lakes and Eastern Canada with fresh to high westerly winds and fine weather. In the Northwest the pressure is high and the weather fine and moderately cold.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 8°—32°; Battleford, 8° below—30°; Qu'Appelle, 8° below—28°; Winnipeg, 8° below—22°; Port Arthur, 6°—32°; Toronto, 18°—36°; Kingston, 14°—34°; Montreal, 12°—30°; Quebec, 6° below—22°; Halifax, 12°—25°.

TODAY'S PROBABILITIES.

TORONTO, March 18—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far as Belleville) are: Fresh to high westerly winds; fine weather.

—Sir Frank Smith was on Friday evening reported to be very much better than for several days past.

—Mr. T. G. Davey, of London, has sold a half interest in Brighton Tobe to the Elford Kennels of Philadelphia.

—Miss Mary Johnson, of Woodstock, is visiting friends in this city. She will return to her home in a few days.

—Miss Bella Morrison, of Woodstock, is in town visiting friends. She is staying at 132 Maple street at present.

—Mr. Edmund T. Perry, Montreal, high chief ranger, A. O. F., is in town and was driven about the city on Saturday afternoon.

—The relief committee of the Trades Council has had a very busy month and has disposed of a great amount of provisions among the needy.

—Arrangements are being made already for an excursion to Detroit on May 24 by Court Forest Queen, A. O. F. Another excursion will run to Sarina on the same day, under the auspices of the Sons of England.

—There was a large attendance at the meeting of the Baconian Club on Saturday night. Mr. O. J. Stevenson presented a clear outline of Kidd's work on social evolution, which was afterwards contrasted by Rev. M. P. Talling with Drummond's theories in "The Ascent of Man." A highly interesting and profitable discussion followed.

—Lyns Haines, the young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Haines, of Brick street, who was so terribly burned on Friday, is not making very rapid progress towards recovery at the City Hospital. The physicians were unable to dress the little girl's wounds until last night, but they see no reason why she should not recover.

—"Grip herabouts this season," said a physician, "is marked by short duration, two or three days, and is not attended by so serious a physical and mental depression as characterized it two or three years ago. The posterior nares are painfully affected with catarrhal symptoms. It looks as if the disease was becoming attenuated with years. This time it has not come from Europe. It has become domesticated in this country."

—The death occurred yesterday at 560 Hamilton road of Elizabeth Alice, wife of Mr. Edward Gardner, of the London Furniture Works. Mrs. Gardner had been ill for several weeks. She was 32 years of age, and left no children. Deceased was a native of the city of London, where Mr. Gardner is choir-master. Mr. Gardner's brother, Henry, of Briscoe street, South London, lost his wife by death only a few weeks ago. The funeral of Mrs. Edward Gardner will take place on Tuesday to Woodland.

—The benefit concert given to Bro. Harry Gardner at the Foresters' Hall, South London, proved the great respect in which he is held by the members of the various lodges who held their meetings there. The chair was taken by Mr. J. Thomas, and the accompaniments of those who took part were played by Miss Edwards in her usual able manner. A good programme was given by the following: The Misses Wilson, Petrie, Smith and Harding, Mr. and Miss Rossier, Messrs. Platt, Judson, Gammon, Gardner, Hartford, Clouston and Nichols. A dialogue by Mr. Hessel, Mr. Manley, Miss Connor and Miss Davies was highly appreciated by the large number present.

—In these days of degenerate comedy force it is refreshing to come across one that preserves fresh images and does not depend upon vulgarity as its chief source of amusement. Such a play is "Charley's Aunt," which will be presented here for the first time this evening at the Grand. Sometimes a New York indorsement is not all that it might be, but "Charley's Aunt" had a prosperous engagement at the Standard Theater, New York, and when it visited the other large cities of the country it repeated its metropolitan success. The piece is said to be an admirable example of dramatic construction. The situations are delightfully absurd and consistently introduced.

—Mr. Benjamin Taylor died at his residence, corner of Colborne and Simcoe streets, on Friday. Mr. Taylor was an old resident of this city. He was born in county Tipperary, Ireland, 70 years ago, and came to Canada in 1853, settling in London and remaining here ever since. He conducted a grocery store for a number of years, and afterwards went into the hardware store of Shaw & Vennart, where he remained many years. For the past twelve years Mr. Taylor suffered from rheumatism, which was the cause of death. Deceased was a married man and leaves a wife, but no children. Mr. James Taylor, engineer of the G. T. A HORSE KILLED.

On Saturday afternoon a son of Mr. Alex. Cattnach, grocer, of Adelaide street, was driving east on Piccadilly street.

A little west of Adelaide street a dog ran into the road, and Cattnach's horse became frightened. It turned around and started in the opposite direction at a smart gait.

The harness was broken and the cutter was left behind. The horse turned south at William to Fall Mall, but in endeavoring to turn east on that thoroughfare slipped on the car track and fell. The animal's fore left shoulder was broken, and the beast was shot yesterday.

FORESTERS' TRIP TO ENGLAND.

This month's Foresters gives full particulars of the arrangements made for the carrying of the delegates to the Supreme Court, which is to be held in August next in London, England. The steamship Kensington, of the American Line, has been chartered.

The excursionists will start from Philadelphia on July 20. The fare will be \$38 from Philadelphia to London and return, which is a very low rate, and includes the railroad fares from Liverpool to London and return, with stop over privileges at many points of interest. There also will be side trips arranged for at special rates to Germany, France, Switzerland, Scotland and Ireland.

All Foresters and their friends may share in this special arrangement and those who wish can get all information by writing or calling on the supreme chief ranger.

KILLED MEN IN GOOD CAUSES.

Capt. F. S. Dugmore, who joined the Royal Canadian Rifles in 1860, and after serving in several regiments retired, superannuated in 1881, is the subject of a sketch in the London Graphic. Capt. Dugmore, with two other gentlemen, was shooting big game at Merefano in British East Africa in October last, when a mission station in the district was attacked by the Somalis, a hostile and powerful tribe. Two hundred warriors had attacked the missionaries and the peaceful tribe with whom they lived.

Capt. Dugmore marshaled a host numbering 5 Europeans and 24 natives and 50 of them. Later on he and his party successfully resisted an attack upon their mission station by the entire Somali force, and by killing their leader put an end to the war for the present. Great credit is given to the new Mamluk rifles, of which the party had two. Capt. Dugmore killed a man with this weapon at a distance of 2,200 yards. The captain was stationed in London, Ont., with the Royal Canadian Regiment in 1861, and is remembered by old-timers here.
