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AN AVALANCHE OF SILVER

In the United States Treasury Department—Millions of Dollars Lumber—Scared Clerks.

PHILADELPHIA, May 3.—There was an avalanche of silver in vault C of the Treasury Department yesterday. The coin was piled up in bags to a height of 12 feet and a width of 8 feet. The vault is damp and the bags had become mouldy and frail. About 3 o'clock, as Wellington Morris, an employee, was standing on the opposite pile raking in some loose silver dollars, he trod upon a bag and silver dollars at once began to slide out. Like a snowball on a mountain side the mass of silver dollars grew in size.

There was an ominous rumbling, and the clerk at the foot of the pile looked up in surprise. Seeing the impending danger, a wild break was made for the door. Dr. Caleb Whitehead, who represents the mint bureau, jumped over the scales at the moment when the dollars poured down with a roar. F. A. Sartori and W. A. Bosbyshell, who are assisting in the counting, scrambled out in the nick of time. Serious injury to Morris was feared, but he succeeded in escaping unhurt. The impact of the dollars shook the mint building as by an earthquake, and intense excitement prevailed among the employees. It is estimated that the amount which fell was valued at fully \$2,000,000, and weighed 112,000 pounds.

A Pioneer Expressman.

BRANTFORD, May 3.—The remains of the late Jonathan Hale were brought to the city yesterday from Port Dover, and were followed to the grave by a large concourse of citizens. Mr. Hale was one of the pioneer stage and expressmen of Western Ontario, and was well and favorably known throughout the whole Province. He entered the business when it was in its infancy, and by expressmen in general was looked upon as a person of great worth.

He was the agent of the Canadian-American Express Company for 30 years in Brantford. Owing to advanced age he retired about four years ago to Port Dover, where he passed the remainder of his days in quietude. He was a man of sterling character, marked by the greatest generosity. His heart, his home and his purse were always open to people in need, particularly to those in his own line of business. In domestic life he was a devoted husband and father, and in politics a staunch Conservative.
