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DISTINGUISHED VISITORS.

Sir Henry Tyler and Party in the City.

A Short Conference With the L. and P.

S. R. Board, But With Results Not

Very Satisfactory—The Q. T.

R. Will Not Better

Its Offers.

A distinguished party of railroad men

was in the city yesterday afternoon for

a short time. It comprised Sir Henry

Tyler, of London, Eng., president of the

Grand Trunk Railway Company; L. J.

Sergeant, general manager; Joseph L.

Wallace, chief mechanical superintendent;

E. P. Mansford, chief engineer of the

western division; and John H. Brown, chief

engineer of the western division. The

train was composed of three magnificent

official cars. The party stepped in the

London and visited the car shops. Their

next halt was at the House of Commons, which

they also examined.

Arrived at the station the visitors were

met by Aldermen Moulton, Taylor, Parnell,

J. W. Jones, Heaman, Carstairs, Coe,

Stevell, and John H. Brown, Mayor

Essary, ex-Ald. F. E. Leonard, Mr. F. A.

Fitzgerald, City Engineer Graydon, and

Sergeant-at-Arms Merritt. It was intended

to give the party a drive around the

city, but their late arrival

prevented this. The Londoners were in-

vited into Sir Henry's private car, where

a short confab was held.

The result was hardly satisfactory to the

visitors, particularly to the L. and P.

S. R. Board, who felt that the railway

concessions were not any better than before

as regards both the car shops and the

London and Port Stanley Railway. He in-

sisted that the railway was a former and declined

to couple the two deals, and that he would

be of any more advantage to the city. The

offer of the G. T. R. for the L. and

P. N. R. lease on the basis of paying 30

per cent. of the gross receipts to the city.

Sir Henry was asked by the board if he

would guarantee that this 30 per cent.

should equal \$10,000 a year, but he re-

fused to do so. As he wished

to proceed to Gloucester to inspect the

King's County branch, he did not

stay long, but said good-bye and "moved

on." The city delegation afterwards held a

consultation meeting in the City Hall. Sir

Henry intimated that he would not be in

the city again, as he was for England in a

week and is pushed for time.
