The civic jubilee committee of the

city Council held their second meeting last night, and decided upon a means of commemorating the 60th anniverary of the Queen's coronation. The object in view is the erection of a twostory ward to the City Hospital, which will be known as the Victoria ward. Dr. J. H. Gardiner's opinion, as sent to the hospital trustees, was read. He believes that the present building could be reconstructed so as to make it a first-class hospital. The essential part of a hospital is the ward, and the best kind of ward is that known as the pa-vilion. It should be two stories high, of high ceilings. He considered the present site the best that can be obtained. To build a ward of the style suggested by Dr. Gardiner would cost about \$20,000. The hospital trustees have \$5,000, and the balance would be raised by the committee. The intention raised by the committee. The intention is not to vote anything from the city treasury for this purpose, but raise a jubilee fund. On the day of the celebration there will probably be attractions at the park, and in the evening an entertainment of some kind. One musician has expressed his willingness o prepare an oratorio for the even-
