London, Nov. 3.—Alfred Austin, the poet laureate, follows Rudyard Kipling, Conan Doyle and Charles Swinburne with some war verses in the Daily News, under the title,

"INFLEXIBLE AS FATE."

When for a passing hour Rome's manly swayed.

Magnitude of

Monday's Fight

British Lost 300 Men on Farquhar's Farm.

This Does Not Include Prisoners and Missing Men.

Detailed Description of the Disaster to Col. Carlton's Column.

Dargai Hero Meiklejohn Lost an Arm at Elandsiaagte.

Death of the Wounded Boer Commander, Gen. Koek.

Cooked News Prepared to Influence the Afrikanders.

Gen. Buller Has No Further Need for Troops Beyond Filling Gaps—Communication with Ladysmith Was Interrupted Yesterday.

London, Nov. 3.—Gen. Sir George Stewart White has cabled the war office that in the engagement on Farquhar's farm, near Ladysmith, on Monday, when Lieut.-Col. Carlton's column was compelled to surrender, six officers were killed and nine wounded. Among the non-commissioned officers and men the casualties were 54 killed and 231 in wounded, a total of 285 killed and 249 wounded. General White promises a list of the missing later.

At 12.40 a.m. today the war office issued the text of the dispatch, which is dated Ladysmith, Nov. 2, 10 a.m., giving the list of casualties among the officers, as follows:

Royal Artillery—Killed: Lieut. J. T. McDougall. Wounded: Major John Dawkins, slightly; Lieut. Harold Belcher.

King's Rifle Corps—Killed: Major T. L. Forster. Wounded: Major Henry E. Buchanan-Riddell and Lieut. H. C. Johnston, both very seriously.

Royal Irish Fusiliers—Wounded: Capt. P. B. H. Price and Capt. W. E. Silver, both severely.

Gloucestershire Regiment—Wounded: Capt. S. Wilcock, Capt. E. Fyffe and Capt. F. S. Sayner, all severely.

Natal Mounted Rifles—Killed: Lieut. Wm. Chapman.

Medical Corps—Killed: Major Edward Gray. The list of the names of non-commissioned officers and men killed and wounded is promised tomorrow.

BOER LOSS AT KIMBERLEY.

An official telegram reporting the condition of the wounded at Kimberley, adds that Colonel Kekewich, the British commander there, has learned from various sources that the Boer losses on the occasion of the late sortie of the British troops from Kimberley were very heavy.

THE FIGHT.

A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph at Ladysmith, filed Monday night, giving a description of the battle said:

"A similar mule stampede occurred to Lieut.-Col. Grimwood's column on the Bulwer side. Ammunition was lost, but our infantry held their own."

It was a serious misfortune that the powerful bluejackets were not summoned sooner, as the result of the battle would have been different."

BOMBARDMENT RENEWED.

DEATH OF GEN. KOECK.

Gen. Jan Koek, who was second in command in the Transvaal force, and was wounded in the battle at Ladysmith, died in
