

MONEY BYLAWS WERE NUMEROUS

City Council Did Not Do Much Last Night But Increase City's Liabilities.

ALL SORTS OF SCHEMES

More Money for the Hospital and Two More Items for the Waterworks System.

Money bylaws were the feature of the council's meeting last evening, five of them being passed or given two readings, aggregating almost \$300,000.

The largest, of course, was that referred to elsewhere, \$123,700, to take over the Beescheme.

The next most expensive was that for \$95,000 to extend the mains system in the city. This was given two readings last night, with no discussion, as it was considered necessary.

Schools Improvements. There was a short debate on the request of the board of education for \$37,500 to make repairs and alterations to the schools of the city.

"It is time to put a stop to the board of education expenditure," said Ald. Cooper. "I think there is a way to do it. Our taxes are kept at an average rate on account of these two things."

However, the bylaw passed.

More for Hospital.

Another bylaw to raise \$5,000 to complete the laundry at the hospital and make alterations to the contagious ward was passed.

"What is this for?" indignantly asked Ald. Cooper. "Is this for the new building or the old building? When are they going to stop this hospital expenditure?"

"When the hospital covers the whole city," retorted Ald. Saunders.

"The right to raise this money was granted to us by the Legislature at the time the \$5,000 was given to the London Health Association," said Mayor Stevely. "The money is needed."

The bylaw passed without further discussion.

More Waterworks.

A bylaw to raise \$7,000 for waterworks, main extension—the usual thing—was passed, as was also a bylaw to borrow \$60,000 for current expenditure.

Carshops.

A communication was read from Mr. E. A. Fitzgibbon, third vice-president of the Grand Trunk Railway, regarding the carshops.

"The letter is quite satisfactory," said Ald. Moorhead. "However, I would like Mayor Stevely, when he is in Montreal, to take this matter up further. We would like to see the company more, and especially the work we want them to send more work here, and try and help us along. It is all right so far as it goes, but it does not go far enough."

Mayor Stevely promised to take the question up when he went to Montreal.

Building Bylaw.

The amendments to the building bylaw and a bylaw defining the limits where certain manufactories may be located, were passed.

W. W. Gamble, on behalf of the Horticultural Society, asked for the free use of the city hall, June 29 and 30, to hold a flower show. Granted.

The residents of Chesapeake street asked that a boulevard be built down the centre of the street, and that the name of the street be changed to Boulevard No. 2.

Want Poles Removed.

Darch & Son asked that all poles on Talbot street be removed. No. 2.

C. E. Wolverton wrote inclosing a plan for the beautifying of the city. No. 2.

Thomas Martindale wrote regarding the proper methods of advertising the city. No. 1.

The resolution of No. 3 committee to give the clerk full control of fruit men on the market, was sent back for consideration.

Selling City Land.

J. C. Judd, K. C., appeared before the council and asked that the proposition of No. 3 committee to sell Mr. Templar some land near the No. 5 fire hall be sent back until they consulted with the committee.

Ald. Garratt proposed to sell Mr. Templar 24 feet for \$240, but this was not what Mr. Templar wanted, and so he asked for an opportunity to consider the matter. This was agreed to.

Orange Demonstration.

The county Orange lodges asked for the use of Queen's Park on July 12. Granted, so far as the council had power.

George S. Jolly was given the contract for painting the butchers' pavilion for \$101.

Those present were Mayor Stevely, Ald. Ferguson, Beattie, Parsons, Gerratt, Stewart, Moorhead, Fitzgerald, Saunders, Rose, Cooper, Gerry, and City Clerk Baker.

BLOCKED BY STOLYPIN

Heads of Reactionary Demonstration Against the Duma.

St. Petersburg, June 21.—Premier Stolypin has put an end to the plan of the reactionary organizations to turn the celebration at Poltava next month of the bi-centennial of the famous battle into a demonstration against the Duma and the reform manifesto of Oct. 3. The League of Russian People had planned to hold a general congress at Poltava during the celebration, and to send a deputation to the Emperor. The Emperor declined to sanction this proposal. He informed the league that place had been reserved for only 175 representatives and the delegates to the congress subsequently announced that they would not be present.

MONTREAL'S NEW DEPOT

Two Million Dollars To Be Spent on Grand Trunk Station.

Montreal, June 21.—The Grand Trunk have completed plans for a fine new two-million-dollar station to replace the present station at Bonaventure. This move on the part of the Grand Trunk will be pushed to completion as soon as possible, and will keep them as close competitors to the C. P. R., who are also planning to spend over a million dollars on enlarged and improved terminals.

The Grand Trunk station will be built after the style of the large terminal station at St. Louis, Mo., and will cost, together with the necessary arrangement of tracks, well over two million dollars. Conditions at Bonaventure station have been anything but favorable for the proper handling of traffic for some time past, owing to the congested condition existing at this terminal. At the present time this station is providing terminal facilities for four large railways—namely, the Grand Trunk, the Delaware and Hudson, the Intercolonial and the Central Vermont. With the new station will come the elevation of tracks through the city and the abolition of all level crossings. It is understood that the work will be commenced on this new station as soon as arrangements are completed with the city for changing the street crossings.

a labor man, one who had served his apprenticeship at a trade, or had come to Parliament direct from the workshop, the mine, or the factory, was alone competent to fill the position.

The Mail's utterances were dishonest, and no one knew better than the one who penned them. In saying it he was only saying what four-fifths of the press of Canada, Conservative and Liberal, were saying. The labor press, had said—that the Mail and Empire or whoever is responsible for its columns, did not believe, never did believe, and does not, never believe, what is recorded there. A desire to further party strife, and the worst form of strife—that of setting class over against class, was alone at the bottom of what has appeared, and that he contended, is not only the most unpatriotic and unworthy kind of party warfare, but the most unprincipled and vicious.

"What is wanted today," Mr. King maintained, in closing, "is a closer relationship between our universities and our workshops, a better understanding by educated men of the problems and conditions which confront the thousands who labor that the wealth of the world may be produced, and a greater opportunity for the man in the workshop, the factory and the mine, on the railway and the sea, the laborer and the skilled artisan, to rise through self-improvement, as the men who have made history for the most part have all risen as his workmen. The conditions of this town has risen—to take a larger share in the discharge of those public duties which demand for their fulfillment carrying out not more of physical than of intellectual and moral strength."

"I hope," he added, "to live to see the day when a workman will hold the portfolio, which I now have the honor of holding, when our workmen will find a place in Parliament. But when it comes, I hope it will be, not as the representative of a class, but as the representative of a class distinction, but as citizens, or a class distinction, but as citizens, esteemed and respected by their fellows, because of their desire and because of their capacity to serve the common good."

"If anything further is needed to express what I feel most deeply at the moment, it is that in the work which lies ahead, I hope you, my countrymen, will be as lenient in your judgments, as you have been in the past, that the workmen of Canada will feel that the task is not mine alone, that without their co-operation little can be achieved, and that, so far as in me lies, I shall endeavor to discharge without fear and without favor the duties of a minister responsible to all the people, and charged with defending the honor of his name, of his country and of his country."

OSGOODE HALL ECHOES

Case of Smith vs. London Stands Till September—A Poor Memory.

Toronto, June 22.—At Osgoode Hall, a motion by Mr. W. E. Middleton, K. C., for the plaintiff, in the action of Smith vs. London, to invalidate the hydro-electric power contract to extend the time for appealing to the divisional court, was allowed to stand over till the September sittings.

Has a Poor Memory.

"I do not think plaintiff intended to be dishonest in his evidence, but he has not a very good memory," says Chief Justice Falconbridge in his judgment dismissing with costs the action of Thomas J. Stockwell, of Kingsville, Essex County, against the Doty Engine Works Company, Limited, of Goderich. The plaintiff claimed repayment of \$9,000, the amount paid by him on account of the price of \$12,000 for the steamer Lincoln, and \$916 the amount paid by him on repairs of the boat, because of alleged defective workmanship, or else damages for alleged breach of agreement and improper sale and delivery up of promissory notes, and an account of the moneys received by defendant from plaintiff, or on his behalf.

A joint farewell and reception will be held in the First Methodist Church, Hamilton, on Thursday evening, when the Rev. E. B. Lanceley, of this city, who after next Sunday will have charge of that church, will be received by the congregation, and the retiring pastor, the Rev. R. J. Treleaven, will be tendered a farewell. Rev. Mr. Lanceley received a request from the board of the church some days ago, asking that he and Mrs. Lanceley might be present. They will leave Thursday morning, returning again on Friday (till after next Sunday).

TROUBLE OVER DRAIN IN LOCAL MARKET

Medical Health Officer Hutchinson Had T. Blanchard in Court Today.

The case of T. Blanchard, charged by M. H. O. Hutchinson with a breach of the health act, came up in court this morning, and by request was adjourned until next Tuesday, on condition that Mr. Blanchard abates the nuisance.

The trouble is over a drain on the market, and the court stated that since Mr. Blanchard ordered the city employees, who came to fix it, off his premises, he will have to bear all the costs himself.

Picked on Indian List. William Hiler, arrested for being drunk, said he had not been up for many months.

"I am going to put you on the Indian list," said the court. "You are an obnoxious person to have around any hotel, and I want you to understand that you must keep out altogether. I will fine you heavily if you come up again."

Was Not Set Upon and Beaten by a Crowd of Roughs.

The story going the rounds that Mr. W. G. Howlett of this city, was set upon by a bunch of rowdies on Saturday at Port Stanley and badly beaten is absolutely untrue, Mr. Howlett, he declares that there is not a scratch on him as was stated.

"I was down to the Port on Saturday, fishing," said Mr. Howlett. "My wife was with me and we caught a fine string of fish. As for being attacked, it is untrue, as no person attacked me or made any attempt to do so. Such a story does me an injustice as does also the insinuation that some of my employees were mixed up in it."

Beings Issued by Forestry Branch, Department of Interior.

Ottawa, June 21.—The forestry branch of the department of the interior has recently issued the first sheets of a new "forest atlas," which will include plans of the Dominion forest reserves, of which the surveys are now being carried out; this designates the marks used to denote natural features, the different species of trees and the amounts of timber that can be obtained per acre from timbered areas, entries of various kinds (such as homesteads, mineral lands, etc., burns or bruises, cuttings and sales, color trails, railways, canals, fumes, telegraph and telephone lines, buildings, etc.).

One of the smaller forest reserves—that known as "The Pines," situated near Prince Albert, Sask.—has already been mapped, and the map of the riding mountain forest reserve, in Northwestern Manitoba, is now in preparation. As surveys of the forest reserves and other forested districts are completed, maps of these will be prepared and added to the atlas. It is hoped that the general scheme of indicating information, such as the different colors for stands of timber of various densities, and the other special signs adopted by the forest service of the Dominion may be put into general use throughout Canada, so that forest maps may be uniform in plan and may be easily compared.

NEWS FROM ROOSEVELT

President and His Son Continue to Bag the Big Cats.

Naivasha, British East Africa, June 22.—After comparative silence for over a fortnight, the first news of the Roosevelt expedition came into Naivasha today. All the members of the expedition are in excellent health, and the party is at present in camp on the Loloma plains, in the Sotik district.

Theodore Roosevelt has shot another lion, while a very large tawny-maned lion has fallen before the rifle of his son Kermit. This animal holds the record for size on the present expedition. Kermit has also killed two cheetahs. In addition the party has secured three giraffes, two eland, six topi, and a large number of minor antelope. All the skins are being preserved for the National Museum at Washington.

WOOD TRIMS HOLMER. Halifax, N. S., June 21.—In the fifteen-mile race at the Arena tonight Abbie Wood, of Montreal, defeated Hans Holmer by two laps in the fast time of 1:26:39. Wood took the lead at the start and finished the first mile in 4:57. He lapped Holmer in the fourth mile, and was right behind him

again at the eleventh, maintaining this position until the last lap, when he forged ahead with a magnificent spurt and breasted the tape slightly in advance of the other runner.
