As soon as Carney told Wendling to leave the car, Clements advised his client in an un-flertone, and a struggle ensued. JAPAN ADVANCES . DUTY ON IMPORTS

New Tariff Law to Go Into Effect July 17, 1911, Makes Many Changes.

Washington, Aug. 12:-American trade with Japan may be seriously Prussian Artillery Have No Trouble affected after July 17 next year, on which date the duties in the new Japanese tariff law go into effect. This was the fear expressed in a statepartment, in which are detailed the most important changes to be made by the new law.

Unless reciprocal tariff concessions are made by the two countries before the date in question, a number of under the present conventional Japan-






