

ALLEGED GIRL SLAYER FIGHTS DETECTIVE

Wendling Objected to Being
Transferred From Train
to Auto.

O'ney, Ill., Aug. 1. — Joseph A. Wendling, charged with the murder of Alma Kellner, in Louisville, became a refractory prisoner here today, and objected to Chief of Detectives Carney, of Louisville, taking him from the Baltimore and Ohio Southwestern train. In a struggle Wendling kicked a reporter for a Louisville paper, who is following the alleged slayer.

The prisoner was handcuffed to Carney at the time. He refused to leave the train after his attorney, J. R. Clements, had spoken with him. Wendling was put in an automobile, which went southeast along the Illinois Central tracks. Carney told the station agent he probably would take an Illinois Central train into Kentucky. He wanted the time of his arrival in Louisville kept secret.

Clements, who caught the train in St. Louis after Carney had put his prisoner aboard today, rode in the same car with Wendling. As soon as Carney told Wendling to leave the car, Clements advised his client in an undertone, and a struggle ensued. Carney and two newspapermen pushed Wendling through the doorway into the station platform. The automobile was engaged by Carney by telegraph. Clements did not leave the train here.

FAST MOVING BALLOONS EASY MARK FOR GUNS

Prussian Artillery Have No Trouble
Bringing Them Down.

Ruegenwalde, Prussia, Aug. 11. — The men behind the field guns demonstrated their ability to destroy swiftly moving balloons today. Several batteries of field artillery were practiced against the aerial craft, which were towed by the cruiser Undine. The results from the standpoint of the marksmen were brilliant. In every instance the shells reached the balloons, tearing them to pieces, and frequently the gas bags exploded and were burned in midair.

Major Gross, the aeronautical representative of Krupp, directed the practice.

WIFE DISCOVERS HUSBAND MARRIED

A Bigamy Charge for a Contractor of
Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—George H. Ruff, an Englishman, who came to this country three or four years ago, appeared in the police court this morning, charged with bigamy. The charge was made by his first wife, whom he married in England, in September, 1904, and who arrived here a week ago, and after investigation found her husband married to another. Ruff, who is a builder and contractor, married Miss H. Graham, in this city, last April. He has one child, a daughter, by his first wife. He made no plea or election this morning, and on his request was remanded for a week.

RUSHING HYDRO CABLES

Rapid Work Being Done by Hydro-
Electric Contractors.

Toronto, Aug. 11.—The construction of the hydro-electric power transmission line is being pushed ahead with all speed. Contractor McGuigan stated today that when the line is completed there will be over 3,000 miles of cable. Of this, over 80 miles has already been put in place. Over 150 men are now employed on cable work. The wires will be placed over the Welland Canal tomorrow, and by Saturday the line is expected to be completed between the Falls and Dundas, a distance of 60 miles, over which is strung ten cables, making 600 miles of steel and aluminum cables for the conduct of power, and the arrest of lightning. Within a few days the line will be completed from Waterdown to Berling, a distance of 35 miles. Over this expanse six cables will be strung by Saturday, or 210 miles. All the men available for this class of work are employed, and among the electrical workers it is difficult to get the men. The work of climbing 60 towers of cross-plates of three-eighths of an inch in thickness soon plays the men out. When the work is started between Hamilton and Toronto it will be rushed with extra speed, but just when this will be no one knows.

JAPAN ADVANCES DUTY ON IMPORTS

New Tariff Law to Go Into
Effect July 17, 1911, Makes
Many Changes.

Washington, Aug. 12.—American trade with Japan may be seriously affected after July 17 next year, on which date the duties in the new Japanese tariff law go into effect. This was the fear expressed in a statement made today by the state department, in which are detailed the most important changes to be made by the new law.

Unless reciprocal tariff concessions are made by the two countries before the date in question, a number of important articles of export from the United States which enjoy low rates under the present conventional Japanese tariff, will have to pay considerably increased rates under the statutory tariff.

Among these articles are rails, the duty on which will be raised from 5 per cent ad valorem to about 20 per cent ad valorem; locomotives and tenders, which will be subjected to a similar increase; pipes and tubes of cast and wrought iron from 10 per cent ad valorem to specific rates ranging from 15 to 20 per cent ad valorem; sole leather, from 15 to 20 per cent ad valorem; paraffin wax, from 5 to 20 per cent ad valorem; iron nails, from a specific duty amounting to about 10 per cent to one estimated at 20 per cent; printing paper from a specific duty of about 10 per cent to one 13.5 per cent; insulated electric wire from 5 per cent ad valorem to about 24 per cent, and railway passenger cars from 5 per cent to 30 per cent ad valorem.

Most of the articles of American export to Japan which now enjoy the old statutory tariff of Japan will pay an increased duty under the new statutory tariff of about 5 per cent ad valorem. Among these articles are electrical machinery, wheat, steam engines, pumping, milling, sewing, drilling and boring machines, mining machines, steam turbines, steam boilers and hydraulic motors. In all of these the increase will be 50 per cent ad valorem, except wheat, where it will be from 15 to 19.2 per cent ad valorem.

LENEVE GIRL PAYS

\$20 FOR FINE WIG

Spends Last Penny to Beautify
Herself for Trial in
London.

Quebec, Aug. 12.—Ethel Clare Leneve will return to England to stand trial on a charge of homicide wearing one of the best wigs to be found in Quebec. The girl today gave to Matron Phillips, of the provincial jail, \$20, all that was left of the \$60 she brought from Antwerp on her flight with Dr. H. H. Crippen, and told her to buy a "Peruke" that would repair to best advantage the ravages inflicted by Crippen when he sheared off his companion's light brown tresses to disguise her as a boy.

The matron brought back a wig that is said to work a wonderful transformation in the girl's appearance. She will not wear it in jail, but will reserve it for the return voyage and her appearance in court in England.

Inspector Dew today said that Sergeant Mitchell and the two Scotland Yard wardresses who will help him guard his prisoners on the return journey were on the Lake Manitoba. This steamer is due here late Saturday night or early Sunday morning. Dew would not say on what steamer his party expects to return.

DOCTOR OFFERS HIMSELF AS HOSTAGE FOR HYDE

Would Take Murderer's Place
in Jail Until Baby Is
Born.

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 12.—The wife of Dr. B. C. Hyde will shortly become a mother. Dr. Hyde was convicted of the murder of Col. Swope and sentenced to life imprisonment. He is now in jail awaiting the outcome of his appeal to a higher court.

A letter has been received by Judge R. H. Latsaw, of the criminal court, from Dr. M. T. Murphy, 124 Brooklyn avenue, in which Dr. Murphy offered to take Hyde's place in the county jail until the expected Hyde heir comes. "I realize that of all times Dr. Hyde should be at his home now," Dr. Murphy said last night. "Yesterday I resolved to offer myself to the judge and stay locked up in jail if he would release Dr. Hyde."

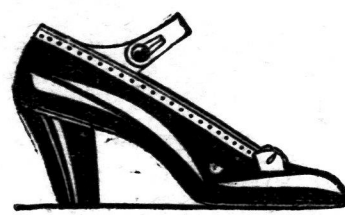

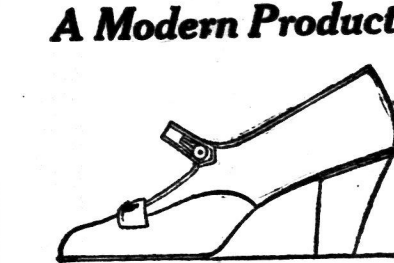

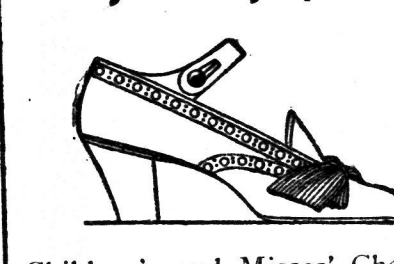
