THE DEATH IN SCOTLAND OF THE REV. DR. PATRICK

Principal of Manitoba College, Chairman of Union Committee of Presbyterian Church and Noted Scholar.

Glasgow, Sept. 28.—The Rev. Dr. William Patrick, principal of Manitoba College, died today at Kirkcaldy, Scotland. The distinguished principal of the Manitoba College suffered a hemorrhage to the brain in July last shortly after the general assembly, and his brother, Mr. David Patrick, of Kirkcaldy, came to Canada and took him home to Scotland. Those who knew how serious was his illness realized that he had gone home to die. From that time until his death he suffered loss of memory, and his intellect relapsed into complete unconsciousness. A Notable Career. The late Dr. Patrick was born in Glasgow in 1852 and was educated at Glasgow University and Heidelberg. In the years he spent at Glasgow University he was known as one of the cleverest students at that great educational institution, distinguishing himself particularly in science, philosophy, classics and mathematics. He was a great linguist and was also to the fore in all matters of student of organic union.

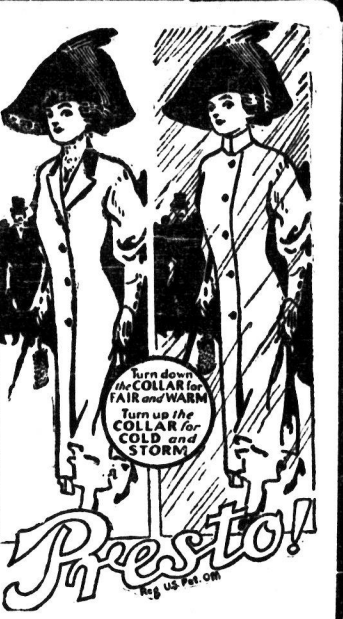
FARMER NOW FACES CHARGE OF MURDER
