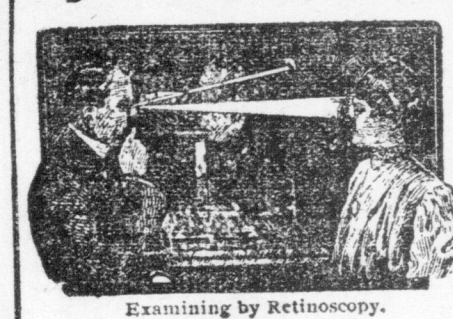

## WILLIAM C. ALLEN ALMOST HAD WARD FORMANSHIP

Ald. Rose, However, Made an Amendment Which Sent the Matter Back.

An interesting point of order was brought up at the meeting of the city council on Monday night.

For some time past, in fact, since Mayor Graham has been presiding over the council, it has been the custom to read the various clauses of the reports of the several committees, vote on them, and later when all of them have been read, the chairman moves the adoption of the report as a whole.

It worked out rather peculiarly on Monday night, and Ald. Richter raised an interesting point of order. He moved that the report of the Robert Logan was recommended for the position of ward foreman of ward 3. Ald. Bennett moved in amendment that W. C. Allen be appointed to the position.

On the division of the council Mr. Allen was appointed.

**Tripped Up.**  
When the report of the committee was finally read, Ald. Robinson, the chairman, moved that the report as a whole be passed. Ald. Johnston, who had supported Mr. Allen when the clause was discussed, had left the council chamber for a few minutes, and during his absence Ald. Rose moved in amendment that the report be amended to allow for the appointment of Mr. Logan instead of Mr. Allen.

The vote was a tie, and it looked as if the whole report would be held up, when Ald. Coles moved that the report be passed, with the clause making for the appointment being referred back for further consideration. This was agreeable to all and the report was finally amended on that line.

**A Nice Point.**  
"My contention is that when a clause is passed, it is passed," said Ald. Richter. "To reverse it, would require a two-thirds vote of the council. What position are we in? It may be that some matters have been irregularly or illegally dealt with. I would like to know where you obtain the authority for the ruling."

"I cannot recall the rule at the present time," answered Mayor Graham. "It was the practice when I was in the council before, and also the rule in the board of education. However, I will look up the rule and report later."

## NUTTER MAY BE REAPPOINTED

City Architect Relieved of His Position as Building Inspector.

**A STEP BACKWARD**

Some of the Aldermen Opposed the Dismissal of the City Architect Last Night.

City Architect Nutter was relieved of his position as building inspector on Monday evening by the council, the bylaw appointing him without salary having been repealed.

However, the question of salary, and the matter of calling for applicants for the position, were left to No. 3 committee. There is much sympathy for Mr. Nutter in the committee, and he may be reappointed.

Ald. Moore severely criticised the finance committee for recommending the dismissal of Mr. Nutter.

"It is not one, but many steps backward," he stated. "We might as well repeal the building bylaw and allow things to go haphazard as they used to. I never knew of a more unconsidered move. The committee should consider the salary and other matters very carefully before bringing in a recommendation."

**Rather Arbitrary.**  
The finance committee is acting in a very arbitrary manner in this question," declared Ald. Murphy.

He moved that the bylaw appointing Mr. Nutter, without salary, be repealed, and the question of engaging another, and the salary to be paid, be left with No. 3 committee.

"This is a very bad bit of business," declared Ald. Rose. "Here you dismiss Mr. Nutter as city architect, and recommend a building inspector at the same salary. Mr. Nutter acted in good capacities. I do not think this is good business."

The department cost us \$3,000 last year," answered Mayor Graham. Ald. Richter, in considering the matter, declared that a sewer inspector was badly needed in the city, and thought the offices of building inspector and sewer inspector could be combined.

Ald. Murphy's motion carried, and No. 3 will take the matter up at once.

In response to a question from Ald. Rose regarding street railway matters, Ald. Johnston declared that a meeting would probably be held on Wednesday evening to discuss the various questions.

**Firemen's Benefit Fund.**  
Ald. Rose wanted to know what was being done regarding the firemen's benefit fund, and Ald. Ashplant replied that the matter was being properly adjusted, and a report would be submitted shortly.

City Engineer Wright reported that the flood had done about \$350 damage to the sewage farm, and it was decided to refer the matter of repairs to the board of works with power.

Those present were Mayor Graham, Ald. Richter, Spittal, Bennett, Johnston, Ashplant, Murphy, Rose, Moore, Coles, Robinson, Blandford, and City Clerk Baker.

## MR. JOHN KERR WAS A PIONEER OF BROOKE

Died at His Home After an Illness Extending Over Many Years

North Brooke, April 15.—One of the oldest settlers of Brooke died at his home here yesterday, in the person of Mr. John Kerr, who was in his 88th year. Along with his wife, Flora McLaughlin, who is still hearty at the age of 85 years, he came from Argyleshire, Scotland, to Canada in 1855, and settled on the place, at present occupied by Wm. Cummings, on the 9th concession, where he lived for ten days, as the dam of the new church which still stands.

From here they moved to their present location on the 8th concession, where the family has lived ever since. He was a faithful member of the old log church until the new church, Chalmers Presbyterian Church, was erected on the corner of the 10th concession and the Navajo road, which he attended as long as he was able to leave the house. For over seven years he was afflicted with a malady which prevented him from lying down, and which compelled him to sleep in the chair, which he occupied for many years. It was necessary for one or two members of the family to be up every night with him throughout the period. And it was during the last three days of his illness that he was able to lie down. He passed away quietly with the family around on Sunday morning about 12:30.

Besides his widow, he leaves a family of five to mourn his loss, all of whom are at home, Margaret, Duncan, Mary, Sarah and Jessie. The funeral takes place from the residence on the 8th concession to the Alvinston Cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, April 16, at 2 o'clock, and will be conducted by Rev. J. Ure Stewart.

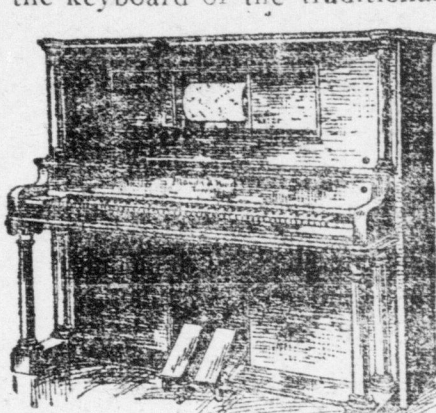
