## MONSTER CROWD AT OPENING OF SARNIA'S NEW MARKET

Wives Throng Square and Eagerly Buy Up Fine Lot of Pro-  
duce Brought In by Farmers for Miles Around—  
a Big Step Forward.

Sarnia, Sept. 27.—Sarnia's fine new  
market was formally opened today in  
the presence of the greatest crowd that  
has been in town in twenty years.

Farmers drove in early for miles  
around, bringing with them great  
quantities of produce. They had hard-  
ly arrived before hundreds of house-  
wives with big market baskets over  
their arms were there waiting to buy.

No business was done, however, un-  
til after the market had been formally  
opened by Mayor Bell. Addresses were  
made by Dr. Henderson, F. F. Pardee,  
M. P., Hon. W. J. Hanna, and Messrs.  
Lester, Stanley and Williams.

All spoke of the benefits the new  
market will be, and complimented  
those who had been successful in put-  
ting the scheme through after years of  
discussion.

Thousands of dollars' worth of pro-  
duce changed hands in a short time,  
as soon as selling started, and there  
is no doubt that the new market is one  
of the most progressive of many steps  
opened by Mayor Bell. Addresses were  
made by Dr. Henderson, F. F. Pardee,  
M. P., Hon. W. J. Hanna, and Messrs.  
Lester, Stanley and Williams.

Home Rule for Scotland if  
IT IS ALLOWED IN IRELAND

F. J. Robertson, of Edinburgh. Says Every Effort Will Be Made  
To Secure Similar Privilege—England and Wales To  
Have Separate Parliaments Also.

New York, Sept. 27.—The home rule  
in Ireland will be followed by home rule  
in Scotland was the assertion of F. J.  
Robertson, a city official of Edinburgh,  
in an address last night on "Home Rule  
in Scotland," at a meeting under the  
auspices of the Scottish Home Rule As-  
sociation of New York. He summed up  
the purpose of the movement to obtain  
representative government in these  
words:

"It is proposed to relieve the present  
House of Commons of the burden of Scot-  
tish business, and to set up a House of Par-  
liament in Scotland. The idea is that  
each of the four nations of Great Britain  
and Wales, are entitled to and should have  
their own legislation and control of all  
affairs of government concerning their  
own national life, with an Imperial Par-  
liament to look after matters of general  
common interest to all the nations."

Mr. Robertson was the chief factor in  
the organization last May of the Inter-  
national Scots' Home Rule League. When  
he stepped from the New York Central  
train yesterday afternoon he had com-  
pleted 12,700 miles of travel in Canada  
and the United States, speaking in nearly  
every important city on the subject of  
Scottish home rule. Last night he told  
his audience that the enthusiasm his  
subject met with everywhere, resulting  
in local associations being formed, among  
others, in Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver,  
Philadelphia, Chicago, Minneapolis,  
Seattle, Boston and Albany. He is pay-  
ing his own expenses, and not a penny  
is being asked for as a campaign fund.

CUTTING BOX BURST

Several Narrowly Escaped Being Hurt  
on Farm Near Wyoming.
