NEW JEWISH COLONY FOR WESTERN CANADA

Fund to Purchase the Land Nearly all Raised at Meeting.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—S. W. Jacobs, K.C., president of the Baron de Hirsch Institute, in proposing the health of the Canadian Federation at the Zionist banquet here last evening, made the announcement that the Jewish Colonization Society of Paris, of which he was a Canadian representative, was shortly to found a Jewish colony in Western Canada, similar to that which had already been founded with so great success in the Argentine.

A second Canadian colony for Jews in Palestine was decided upon today in the closing hours of the Zionist convention, and \$8,000 of the \$10,000 necessary for the purchase of land was subscribed by societies and individuals before the convention rose. This came as a result of the announcement of the work being done in the first colony, founded since the 1911 convention. This had been named "Canada," and consisted of 300 acres of land, a large tract in that country, and included plantations, buildings, and a complete equipment. An offer to stock the land with the necessary cattle, horses, and the like, made by a German society, had been refused, and the money was now ready to be used to maintain the colony as one founded and supported exclusively by Canadian Jews. It was already peopled with a number of refugees from Kiev, Russia, affording these people a much-needed place of safety where they could earn their own living unmolested.

DARING FEATS

Birdmen Loop-the-Loop in Sixty-Mile-an-Hour Gale.

New York, Dec. 27.—A Herald cable from London says:
Despite a cold blowing sixty miles an hour, three airmen looped the loop in England yesterday. The airmen, Hamel and M. Chanticiet at Hendon, and Mr. C. B. Huicks at Aintree, Liverpool, accomplished the feat. Mr. Chanticiet executed his loops from heights of 1,000 and 1,300 feet, and made a backward loop of 1,000. He received a great ovation.
Mr. Hamel described three single loops within a minute of each other, and subsequently two more loops. He also flew upside down. He damaged his monoplane in landing, but was extricated uninjured.

Mr. Huicks looped the loop in a gale at Aintree and won a wager.

TWO SHOTS FIRED

Sensation Was Caused in Front of the Barracks at Zabern.

Zabern, Alsace, Germany, Dec. 27.—Two shots were fired today by an unidentified civilian in front of the barracks recently occupied by the Ninety-Ninth Infantry regiment, one of whose officers, Lieut. Baron Von Forstner, caused the trouble between the military and civilians of this city. The civilian escaped. This is the first incident of the kind in Zabern since the removal of the Ninety-Ninth Infantry, whose place has been taken by another regiment.

NEED NEW RINK

Place Is Required Where Children Can Skate Safely.

Sarnia, Dec. 27.—Prominent citizens are pointing out that something should be done here towards establishing free skating rinks, where the children can go and enjoy themselves and still be free from any danger of drowning. make a big skating rink for the little ones, also the grown-ups, who are fond of fresh air and fine exercise. AUTO OVER BANK FIVE INJURED

Machine Skidded and the Brakes Refused to Work.

SHACKLETON TO GO TO SOUTHERN POLE

All Financial Difficulties for Expedition Have Been Arranged.

London, Dec. 29.—Sir Ernest Shackleton, the Antarctic explorer, writes to the Times today giving the news that the uncertainty about his proposed expedition being realized

ing to lack of funds has been removed.

"I am glad to be able, through the generosity of a friend," he says, "to announce that the expedition to the South Pole, which I have taken the liberty to call the expedition the Imperial Trans-Antarctic Expedition," because I feel that not only the people of these islands, but our kinsmen in all lands under the Union Jack will be willing to assist in the carrying out of our program."

The expedition will start from a South American port.

LEFT A MILLION

Late George Hendrie, of Detroit, Had Many Interests.

Detroit, Dec. 28.—According to the will of the late George Hendrie, which was probated on Saturday, he leaves his entire estate to his widow, Sarah Sibley Hendrie. His three sons, Strathairn, George T., and William, are named as executors. Judge Hendrie declined to appoint the three sons as special administrators, as it is contrary to the rule of the court to appoint more than one member of a family in such a capacity, and asked the family to agree on whom should

be appointed. The will provides that none of the estate at Royal Oak be sold for five years, but that it be held in trust for that time unless the widow should die before the expiration of the five years, when it must go into the rest of the estate. The value of the estate is estimated at close to a million dollars.

FOUND DEAD

Mrs. Jane McManus Stricken Suddenly at St. Kitts.
