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AWAIT HYDRO IN LOBO TOWNSHIP

Applicants Shake Hands With Careful Councillors After Lively Meeting.

Long-Delayed Power Contract May Be Signed in Week's Time.

Special to London Advertiser.
KOMOKA, June 4.—Besides having a population that is so progressive as to want hydro power on its farms and in the homes of its villages, Lobo Township is possessed of a council that has proven itself the most conscientious that ever guarded the interests of ratepayers.

Several months ago about 70 farmers and villagers signed applications for hydro power. Houses and other buildings were wired, fixtures were bought, motors were installed, and all the equipment necessary was procured.

It was then left to the township council to sign a contract with the hydro commission before the commission would turn on the electricity to make homes brilliant and wheels turn on the farms.

So, representative delegations from the applicants, composed of the following: John Graham, James Stewart, C. Waugh, D. Matheson and P. A. McIntyre, waited on the council several times to importune the council to sign a contract with the commission.

Delays Action.
The council received the contract, but did not sign it, delaying action until the applicants became highly impatient. Every day they entered their houses they saw the hanging wires asking bulbs and power.

Then a week ago Reeve James Campbell sent out a notice of a special meeting, stating to the councillors that the question of the hydro contract would be dealt with. The date set was Saturday evening, June 3.

A lively tilt with the council was anticipated by the applicants, because it was generally rumored that the council was unalterably opposed to the signing of the contract. Their expectations were right.

At eight o'clock a majority of the applicants assembled at the Komoka Village Hall to attend the meeting. They had invited from London, since they were proponents of hydro, Phillip Pocock, member of the public utility commission, and A. O. Hunt, assistant public utilities commission manager, to aid them in the debate.

The council arrived close to nine o'clock. Its personnel consists of James Campbell, reeve, William Chapman, deputy reeve, Herbert Steele, L. A. Leckie, and D. Gray, councillors.

Concerning the hydro contract the council had felt, he said, "that there were things in it that we didn't understand and don't understand yet. They owed an obligation, they thought, to the ratepayers."

Balk at Collection.
The sticking point had been around, he explained, the part of the clause which had bound the council to be responsible for the collection of the hydro rate, flat rate and all. They thought that it wouldn't be just to the remaining ratepayers of Lobo Township to be asked to shoulder, nor be liable for the non-payment of any of the applicants.

"We have been unjustly criticized for the delay, but what we have been trying to do is merely to safeguard your interests, since you are ratepayers."

BLENHEIM, June 4.—The school board here have been notified by the continuation school inspector that unless they build a new school there will be no grants from the department of education this year and they are required to give immediate assurance that definite action will be taken with this end in view or the 1922 grants will not be forthcoming.

They went so far a few years ago in the way of meeting the recommendations of the inspector as to purchase a site which is situated on the property in the vicinity of the skating rink. Owing to the high cost of material the matter has been delayed, but now it has been put up to them to get busy.

LINER MONTCALM REACHES QUEBEC

Removed From Sand Bar by Five Powerful Tugs.

MONTREAL, June 4.—According to advices received here today the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company's liner Montcalm was pulled off the sand bar at Champlain, where she had been ashore since 5:30 Friday afternoon, about 5 o'clock this morning.

At high tide a concerted effort was made by five of the most powerful tugs on the St. Lawrence and this was successful.

General examination below was made of the ship by Captain J. O. Walsh, superintendent of the C. P. steamships, when it was found that the Montcalm had suffered little apparent injury, although some of her lower plates had been sprung enough to make her take a little water. Her grounding is said to have been occasioned by the jamming of the rudder.

Sell Serbian Women As Wives For \$20 If Found Perfect Physically

BELGRADE, June 4.—"Mr. Markovitch, I like your daughter. If you can guarantee that she hasn't a wooden leg, one eye or false hair, how much?"
"It's a bargain."
Mr. Markovitch's daughter leaves the paternal fireside arm in arm with her new possessor, and becomes automatically a wife. Just like that.
So says Dr. Charles L. Outland, who returned yesterday from the Fetch country of Serbia, on the Albanian border.
"A woman is rated at one-tenth the value of a cow," he added. "You can buy a fairly good looking, healthy wife for 1,500 dinars, about \$20 in Canadian currency. Arrangements financially have to be made with father, but once you buy a wife she's yours for ever and ever."

There are no divorce laws in Fetch. Of course, you can recall her, if she doesn't make good. But if a girl happens to have some defect, physically or mentally, the prospective wooer lowers his bid, maybe down as low as 900 dinars or about \$13. If the family has pawned off a bride as a perfect piece of feminine goods when she has a wooden leg, the next day the husband returns the bride to her home and collects his money.
"Turkish girls are not allowed to go to school, and in the city of Fetch of 25,000 inhabitants, only six Turkish girls are enrolled in classes.
"Since the buyer of women or girls never sees their faces he is taking a big chance in paying cold cash. Usually he requires a written statement from the girl's family that she is perfect or her defects are enumerated, such as deaf, eyesight poor, limbs a little and so on.
