Washington, July 18.—The following statement was given out this afternoon at the state department: The state department yesterday received from the Philippine commission an important despatch conveying these facts: By the co-operation of the military and the commission, municipal governments have been established in seven important towns in the province of Manila and Cavite. These are working admirably, and a good effect of them is that considerable numbers of the natives are constantly deserting and coming in, and some of them with arms. The system will soon be extended to other towns which are asking for it. Continuous success in this direction will mean the beginning of the end."

Quebec, July 18.—A fire which broke out in the St. Roches suburb of Quebec at 3 o'clock this afternoon destroyed 65 houses, entailing a loss of about \$100,000, with insurance of about half that much. A strong northeast wind was blowing and there was a break in the water main. The old service pipes were quite inadequate. Assistance was summoned from the city, and a detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police rendered good service pulling down houses in the path of the flames. At 7 o'clock before the flames were under control, three blocks were burned. Most of the houses destroyed were wooden buildings. Over a hundred families are rendered homeless.

KNIGHTS OF MACOBBES. Satisfactory Reports on Increasing Membership Presented at Biennial Meeting. Port Huron, Mich., July 18.—The eighth biennial meeting of the Supreme Tent, Knights of the Macobbes, opened today with 85 delegates in attendance, representing nearly every state and the Canadian provinces. The report of Supreme Commander Markey shows a net increase in membership during the biennial period of 43,485. The increase in membership in the entire order, which includes the Supreme Tent, Grand Camp and ladies' organization, during the biennial period was 98,058. The financial statement shows a surplus on hand of \$403,694.

UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS. The Contest Between England and America Close at Hand. London, July 18.—Messrs. Jackson, Wendell, Morrison and Brooks, of the international advisory committee, held a final meeting at Queen's Club, Brighton, this afternoon to complete arrangements and decide upon the order of the Saturday events in the athletic contest between the English and Oxford and Cambridge. It was agreed that the programme should be opened at 4 o'clock by the Fitzhammer-throwing concurrently, closing with the three-mile and high jump.

Weeping Prisoners

Spanish Women Appeal for Some Action to Secure Their Release. Americans Unable to Complete Task They Took From the Spaniards. Though General Otis Again Cables the Great Promise of His Campaign.

Several delegations of women having relatives among the prisoners in the hands of the Filipinos, sought an audience with Senator Silveira, the premier, who had them conducted to the galleries of the Senate, where Count D'Almeida drew a lamentable picture of the suffering of the prisoners, which caused frequent outbursts of sobbing from the women. Count D'Almeida blamed the American authorities and the Spanish government for the fate of these unhappy men.

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Millions To Spend

Immense Appropriations for Public Works in Latest Supplementary Estimates.

Quebec as Usual Gets Lion's Share—Relief for Destitute on the Trails.

Two Public Buildings for Kootenay—Fraser and Skeena River Hatcheries.

Ottawa, July 18.—Supplementary estimates were presented to-day for a total of \$3,500,000, making the appropriations to be voted this session \$51,750,000, with railway and bridge subsidies still to come down. The government of Yukon figures for \$112,000; militia in Yukon, \$125,000; public buildings, Yukon, \$152,000; telegraph lines to Bennett, Yukon trails, roads and bridges, \$175,000. Rossland public buildings, \$15,000; Victoria custom house (old), fitting up for meteorological service, \$1,000; New Westminster public building, \$15,000; new custom house safe, \$500; Nelson public buildings, \$15,000; cattle fittings and box-forts for postoffice, \$1,500; Kamloops public building, \$3,000. Additional judge of the Yukon territorial court, \$4,000; amount required to make salary of clerk of territorial court, Yukon territory, \$2,000 per year, \$1,500; living expenses for two judges in Yukon territory, \$4,000; miscellaneous expenses in cases of hardship on the Yukon territory, \$4,000; required to pay cost of maintenance of prisoners in Yukon, \$15,000. Expenses of relief party and furnishing provisions to distressed people along the Land and Deane rivers, \$25,000. Among the amendments is \$150,000 for improvements at St. Andrews rapids, Man. Montreal harbor gets \$750,000. The Quebec graving dock will be lengthened, at a cost of \$117,000. County court judges in British Columbia get an additional \$2,400. Columbia river practice of bank at Revelstoke, the government of British Columbia contributing a like amount, \$10,500. New dredging plant of British Columbia, \$25,000. To connect Nicola Lake with the Canadian Pacific Telegraph system, \$2,500. For change of route of part of the Oxbow line from the woods to the new roadway, between Qualicum river and Union bay, \$1,200. Legal expenses of arbitration re seizures of sealing vessels by Russian cruisers in 1892, \$8,000. For erection of two fish hatcheries on the Fraser river, and one on the Skeena river, \$12,000.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The house passed a bill for the preservation of health on public works, the outcome of cases of hardship on the Crow's Nest railway. Members on both sides approved the bill. The Senate Sir Mackenzie Bowell moved an amendment to the Bill of Substitution bill, setting forth the inadvisability of proceeding with it, on constitutional grounds. SHAMROCK'S LINES REVEALED.

Swanlike they Cause Hardly a Ripple In Her Wake—Turns as if on a Pivot.

London, July 18.—The Daily Mail, which gives what it calls the "secret of the Shamrock's construction hitherto carefully guarded to prevent it being utilised by America," says: "The Shamrock is designed with swanlike lines, rounded in such a way as hardly to cause a ripple in her wake. Her displacement is shaped almost like a thick letter 'E' so that she can turn on a pivot. It is claimed and proved that she is two seconds faster than the Columbia in start. Those in charge of the Shamrock doubt whether the Columbia has proved her superiority to the Defender and consider it quite on the cards that the Shamrock will have to meet the latter. "The Erin will accompany the Shamrock in crossing the Atlantic. Sir Thomas Lipton will not sail in the Erin, but will leave for the United States on August 26."
