The act has made no provision which enables the government to supply these and the change in the act is designed to remedy this.

Other changes of a minor nature will ake be made. The chief commissioner has already the power to change the regulations with regard to close seasons for game and it is probable that these as far as game birds are affected will be materially shortened.

Pursuit Will Not Be Abandoned According to Attorney-General

A statement was made to the house yesterday by Hon. W. J. Bowser with regard to the hunt for Gun-a-noot, an Indian accused of murdering a white man near Hazelton over a year ago. The expeditions sent after the Indian have been out of touch with headquarters for the last six months. Recently and within a few hours of each other they have arrived at Haz-

successful. The difficulty of capturing the fugitive is accentuated by the fact that he is thoroughly acquainted with the country. He has been accustomed to going out trapping for two and three years at a time in the wilderness and the search to be thorough must cover hundreds of square miles.
