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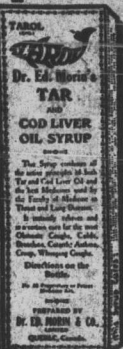

The hospital ward was big and bare, just a huge figure in officer's khaki on his daily inspection, or perhaps a nurse bending over some helpless form broke the uniform sameness of the rows and rows of white cots. In the centre of the room within earshot of all, a talking machine had been placed. To these wounded soldiers this was a gift from the skies, for music will soothe the sick, cheer the lonely and brighten the lives of all its hearers. On this particular morning "Silver Threads Among the Gold" had been played twice, "Annie Laurie" had been entered three times, while "Casey Jones" being the favorite, was played on the moving dial over five times. Can you blame the soldiers for not receiving much inspiration and cheer when just three records had been allotted their ward owing to such a limited supply?

SOLDIERS OF THE SOIL.

Boys enrolled as farm helpers in the Soldiers of the Soil organization, under the auspices of the Canadian Food Board, are doing good work with the seeding. In Ontario 15,000 boys have been enrolled, many of them are now on the land; in Manitoba over 100 are at work; in Saskatchewan 1100 are placed; in Alberta 624; in British Columbia 540; in Nova Scotia 4386; in Quebec over 1000 have been already enrolled. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island are still to be heard from but the enrollment is under way.

TOLD MORGENTHAU OF KAISER'S PLOT

The inside story of the Potsdam conference, at which the Kaiser, deposed on war, was told to United States Ambassador Henry Morgenthau, as by a German who was present at the Kaiser's command. This man was Baron von Wangenheim, the German Ambassador at Constantinople when the war began. Mr. Morgenthau tells the story in the June issue of the World's Work, just published. He says: "The German Ambassador left for Berlin soon after the assassination of the Kaiser, and he now revealed the cause of his sudden disappearance. The Kaiser, he told me, had summoned him to Berlin for an imperial conference on July 5th. The Kaiser presided; nearly all the Ambassadors attended; Wangenheim came to tell of Turkey and enlighten his associates on the situation in Constantinople. Molke, then Chief of Staff, was there, representing the army and Admiral von Tirpitz spoke for the navy. The great bankers, railroad directors, and the captains of German industry, all of whom were so necessary to the war preparations as the army itself, also attended.

"Wangenheim now told me that the Kaiser solemnly put the question to each man in turn: 'Was he ready for war?' All replied, 'Yes,' except the financiers. They said that they must have two weeks to sell their foreign securities and to make loans. At that time few people had looked upon the Kaiser's readiness to go to war as likely to cause war. The Kaiser took all precautions that no such suspicion should be aroused. It decided to give the bankers time to adjust their finances for the coming war, and then the several members went quietly back to their work or started on vacations. The Kaiser went to Norway on his yacht, von Bethmann-Hollweg left for a rest, and Wangenheim returned to Constantinople.

Proud of Germany's Action.
"In telling me about this conference, Wangenheim, of course, admitted that Germany had precipitated the war. I think that he was rather proud of the high performance; proud that Germany had gone about the matter in so methodical and far-seeing a way; especially proud that he himself had been invited to participate in so momentous a gathering. The several blue and yellow books which flooded Europe the few months following the outbreak, and the hundreds of documents which were issued by German propaganda attempting to establish Germany's innocence, never made any impression on me. For my conclusions as to the responsibility are not based on suspicions or belief or the study of circumstantial data. I do not have to reason or argue about the matter. I know.

"The conspiracy that has caused this greatest of human tragedies was hatched by the Kaiser and his imperial crew at this Potsdam conference of July 4, 1914. One of the chief participants, flushed with his triumph at the apparent success of the plot, told me the details with his own mouth. Whenever I hear people arguing about the responsibility for this war or read the claims and lying excuses put forth by Germany, I simply recall the burly figure of Wangenheim as he appeared this August afternoon, puffing away at a huge black cigar, and giving me his account of the historic meeting. Why waste any time discussing the matter after that?

"This Imperial Conference took place July 5, the Serbian ultimatum was sent on July 22. That is just about the two weeks interval which the financiers had demanded to complete their plans. All the great stock exchanges of the world show that the German bankers profitably used this interval. Their records disclose that stocks were being sold in large quantities and that prices declined rapidly. At that time the markets were somewhat puzzled at this movement; Wangenheim's explanation clears up any doubts that may still remain. Germany was changing her securities into cash, for war purposes.

Stock Market Slump The Proof.
"If any wish to verify Wangenheim, I would suggest that he examine the quotations of the New York stock market for these two historic weeks. He will find that there were astonishing slumps in quotations, especially on the stocks that had an international character. Between July 5 and July 22, Union Pacific dropped from 155 1/2 to 127 1/2, Baltimore & Ohio from 91 1/2 to 81, United States Steel from 61 to 50 1/2 Canadian Pacific from 194 to 185 1/2, and Northern Pacific from 115 1/2 to 108. At that time the high protectionists were blaming the Simons-Underwood tariff act as responsible for this fall in value; other critics of the Administration attributed it to the Federal Reserve act which had not yet been passed. How little the Wall Street brokers and the financial experts realized that an Imperial Conference held in Potsdam, presided over by the Kaiser, was the real force that was then depressing the market!

"Wangenheim not only gave me the details of this Potsdam conference, but he disclosed the same secret to the Marquis de Gual, the Italian Ambassador at Constantinople. Italy was at that time technically Germany's ally."

REGISTRATION DAY JUNE 22 ITS MEANING; YOUR HELP WANTED.

Register, June 22.
The Canada Registration Board has been created under the presidency of Senator G. B. Robertson for the purpose of carrying out the registration of the man and woman power of Canada, in order that the information so obtained may be utilized to proceed intelligently with the mobilization of the entire resources of the nation towards the successful prosecution of the war. Data of military value will be secured, but the main purpose to be served by this census of all males and females in Canada over sixteen years of age will undoubtedly be the better distribution of agricultural and industrial labor to the end of securing the maximum results from the productive labor of the Canadian people—especially as regards the essentials of war. One of the most beneficial results which it will expected will follow the offices will be kept open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m.; hence the necessity of providing lighting facilities for the registration places.

Registration Day.
"Registration Day," the date of which is June 22, 1918, will give every Canadian affected by the law an opportunity to perform the great national duty of citizenship. Registrars will be appointed for every federal constituency; these in turn will appoint deputy registrars and assistant deputy registrars in sufficient number to register the entire population. Registration offices or booths will be opened in conveniently situated locations, in factories, school houses, halls, etc., in every municipality, and certificates of registration will be issued to every registrant.

Volunteer Assistance Encouraged.
In order to facilitate this gigantic task, councils, school boards, boards of trade, labor and fraternal organizations, patriotic and Red Cross societies, are invited to assist the registration officials in every possible manner, by providing free of charge suitable locations, school buildings, etc., and by furnishing volunteer helpers to do the clerical work. The registration offices will be kept open from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m.; hence the necessity of providing lighting facilities for the registration places.

Registration a National Duty.
While non-registration entails many penalties of the most serious character it is expected that the Canadian people will look upon registration as a great national duty, to be performed, not out of a sense of compulsion, but rather in a spirit of pure patriotism and as an act of encouragement to our gallant overseas defenders. The registration of the man and woman power of Canada will go forth to the world as the solemn expression of Canada's unalterable determination to support her own and the Allied armies until the final victory.

Registration Will Strengthen Morale of the Army.
The few minutes required for registration, or the one day's salary donated by the willing workers, will be a small sacrifice indeed compared to those now being made by Canadian manhood in the forefront of the battle line. Yet it will be of estimable value in maintaining the splendid morale of our untroubled citizen soldiers to know that those for whom they are fighting on the fields of France and Flanders are not recant to the solemn duty of the hour in their beloved Canada. The duty calls for the exercise of every generous and high resolve in all the avocations of a spirited people whose very existence as a people and whose great heritage is involved in the issue of the struggle.

For the purpose of registration, all the counties in the province of New Brunswick have been grouped into one superintendency. These constitute a registration district. I have been honored with the charge of superintendency of registration for the district outlined, a charge I felt I could accept with the confident expectation that all good citizens of this province would co-operate in order to render the task onerous and to bring it to a successful conclusion.

Education Necessary.
It is particularly desirable that clergymen of all denominations, members of parliament, school teachers, professional agriculturists and members of other professions, journalists, captains of industry, members of council—in short all those who by great influence should make known registration, in order that no false conception of its import may gain ground, or jeopardize its success. The population of the counties included in this registration unit, according to official statistics of the province of New Brunswick is approximately 330,000. Well over one-half, possibly two-thirds of this number will be subject for registration.

The Call and the Response.
The people of New Brunswick responded nobly to the urgent demand of the war; large numbers of their best young manhood have left and are still leaving for the front; in common with the rest of Canada they are answering to the calls of the registration board the clarion voice of a united people, conscious of the justice of its cause, and animated by a common determination to do all in its power to have that cause prevail.

PUBLIC NOTICE

DOCUMENTS TO BE CARRIED

by every male person who is not on active service in any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or in the Naval or Military Forces of any of His Majesty's Allies, and who apparently may be, or is reasonably suspected to be, within the description of **Class One** under the Military Service Act, 1917, who for any reason may have claimed that he is not within **Class One** under the Act.

NOTICE is hereby given that, under the provisions of an Order in Council (P.C. 1013), of the 20th April, 1918, upon and after the 1st day of June, 1918, every male person who is not on active service in any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or in the Naval or Military Forces of any of His Majesty's Allies, and who apparently may be, or is reasonably suspected to be, within the description of **Class One** under the Military Service Act, 1917, by whom or on whose behalf, it is at any time affirmed, claimed or alleged that he is not, whether by reason of age, status, nationality, exception, or otherwise, within **Class One** under the Military Service Act, 1917, as defined for the time being or that, although within the said **Class One**, he is exempted from or not liable to military service, shall have with him upon his person at all times or in or upon any building or premises where he is at any time is,

AGE

If it be claimed that he is not within the **Class One** by reason of age, an official certificate of the date of his birth, or a certificate of his age signed by two reputable citizens residing in the community in which he lives and having knowledge of the facts; or

MARRIAGE

If it be claimed that he is not within the **Class One** by reason of marriage, a certificate, either official or signed by two reputable citizens residing in the community in which he lives and having knowledge of the facts, certifying to his marriage and that his wife is living; or

NATIONALITY

If it be claimed that he is not within the **Class One** by reason of his nationality, a certificate of his nationality signed by a Consul or Vice-Consul of the foreign State or Country to which he claims his allegiance is due; or a passport issued by the Government of that Country establishing his nationality; or

ACTIVE SERVICE

If it be claimed that he is exempted as a member of any of His Majesty's Forces or as having since the 4th August, 1914, served in the Military or Naval Forces of Great Britain or her Allies in any theatre of actual war and has been honourably discharged therefrom, official documents or an official certificate evidencing the fact; or

CLERGY

If it be claimed that he is exempted as a member of the clergy, or of any recognized order of an exclusively religious character, or is a minister of a religious denomination existing in Canada on 28th August, 1917, he is being a

member of any other society or body, a certificate of the fact signed by an officer-holder competent to certify under the regulations of the church, order or denomination, society or body, to which he belongs; or

EXEMPTION

If it be claimed that he is exempted from or not liable to military service by reason of any exemption granted or claimed or application pending under the Military Service Act, 1917, or the regulations thereunder, his exemption papers, or a certificate of the Registrar or Deputy Registrar of the district to which he belongs evidencing the fact; or

OTHER CLASS

If it be claimed that he is not within the **Class One**, or that he is exempted, not liable or exempted upon any other ground, a certificate of two reputable citizens residing in the community where he lives having knowledge of the fact upon which the claim is founded and certifying thereto;

FAILURE TO CARRY REQUISITE EVIDENCE

If upon or after the 1st day of June, 1918, any such male person be found without the requisite evidence or certificate upon his person or in or upon the building or premises in which he is, he shall thereupon be presumed to be a person at the time liable for military service and to be a deserter or defaulter, without leave;

PENALTY

And he shall also be liable upon summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$50 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month, or to both such fine and imprisonment; and moreover, any such person may forthwith be taken into military custody and may be there detained and required to perform military duty in the Canadian Expeditionary Force so long as services shall be required, unless or until the fact be established to the satisfaction of competent authority that he is not liable for military duty.

FALSE CERTIFICATE

The use, signing or giving of any such certificate as hereinbefore mentioned shall, if the certificate be in any material respect false or misleading to the knowledge of the person using, signing, or giving the same, be an offence, punishable, upon summary conviction, by a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars, and by imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months and not less than one month.
