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## MUCH LIQUOR AT BALMORAL

Citizens of That Enterprising Village Up in Arms Over the Matter.

For some time past there have been complaints that liquor has been allowed to be sold in Balmoral, and during the past two weeks the citizens of that village have taken the matter into their own hands and a number of informations have been laid.

It will be remembered that some time ago Inspector T. Mann drove out to Balmoral and in searching the premises of one LeBlanc, was seriously assaulted, but seized a still and a large quantity of liquor.

It appears that this man has again been at his old business and on a recent visit to Balmoral he was found guilty of selling liquor and was fined \$15.00, as well as the making of liquor by the accused no action has been taken by the Inland Revenue officers.

Another Balmoral resident has had two informations sworn out against him and appeared for trial Wednesday. Some evidence was heard and the case postponed until next Wednesday. It seems strange that the Inland Revenue officers are not looking after the illegal distilling of liquor in this section. It is said that there are a number of privately-owned stills throughout this section.

## TOWN COUNCIL MEETING HELD

Short Session Tuesday Evening and Little Business Transacted.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Campbell, McKay, Devereaux, Ingram, Dickie, Matthews and Bissett. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The clerk read a letter from Chief George Ackman, secretary of the Maritime Fire Chief's Association inviting the Campbellton Fire Chief, or Assistant, to attend the convention to be held at Amherst on June 26th.

The communication was referred to the Fire Protection Committee with power to act.

A letter from the Town Solicitor in reference to the application of Mr. John McIntyre for a refund of a part of his license fee for the Imperial Theatre was read.

The solicitor admitted that there was room for doubt as to whether the license for this matter was based in 1913 and 1914.

There was considerable discussion in reference to this matter, some of the councillors expressing the opinion that Mr. McIntyre was an excellent case.

On motion the matter was laid on the table for future consideration.

The McLennan Foundry & Machine Works explaining that previous to the passing of the Bylaw respecting transient laborers they had hired about twenty-five skilled mechanics to come to Campbellton to finish their vessel. These were men who could not be procured here and were guaranteed a certain wage clear of all expenses. If the Bylaw was enforced the license fees would have to be paid by the firm.

The matter was discussed, but no decision arrived at and it was laid over until the next meeting.

Coun. Dickie from the Water and Sewerage Committee recommended that the Dueset be given an increase of salary from \$3 to \$3.50 per day, and laborers from \$2.75 to \$3.00, dating from June 1st.

During the passing of accounts there was considerable discussion and instructions were given that all orders for supplies must be ordered through the Town Clerk.

Coun. McKay asked if anything further had been learned about the Housing Scheme. This was a very important matter and should be pushed. Many families were prevented from moving to town because no houses were available.

The Clerk was instructed to write to Frederick in reference to this matter.

Mr. W. H. Wallace was given permission to address the Council.

He stated that he had an option on the O'Leary property and wanted to know if the town would agree to put a street across the property and to the town and sewerage along new street.

As this was a big subject Mr. Wallace was invited to present Monday evening when another meeting would be held.

Coun. Matthews moved that the matter of a town hall and fire station be the first order of business after reports of committees at the next meeting. Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

## SCHOLARSHIPS TO N. B. PUPILS

Lord Beaverbrook Agrees to Play Interest in Education.

Newcastle, June 25.—Lord Beaverbrook will offer five scholarships for the Province of New Brunswick. The scholarships can be held at any Canadian University and will be of the value of \$325 a year for the period of a whole course, either in arts, theology, law, medicine, civil engineering, etc. but except in the case of theology the scholarships will not be granted for students attending denominational colleges. They will be awarded by competitive examination and will be open to all students taking the matriculation examinations of the University of New Brunswick.

There is a further proviso that three out of the five scholars must come from centres outside of St. John and Fredericton. Lord Beaverbrook will ask the Lieutenant-Governor, Mr. Justice Crockett, and Mr. Frank Ellis to act as a committee for the purpose of making the awards, and this committee is to take into consideration the financial position, moral character and industrial habits of the candidates. The sum of \$25,000 has been paid to the Montreal Trust Company and set aside for the use of the committee which is to make careful observations of the working of the scheme during what may be considered an experimental period.

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## HELD ENTHUSEASTIC

Delegates Present From All Sections of County—Delegates Chosen.

An enthusiastic meeting of all those opposed to the present Union Government was held in the Murray Hall last evening and was very largely attended, delegates being present from all sections of the County.

A number of resolutions were unanimously adopted and Messrs. J. M. Anderson and Jas. E. Reid were appointed as delegates to attend the Liberal Convention at Ottawa in August. Messrs. Jos. Duncan and Alex. C. Levesque were named as alternate.

The utmost enthusiasm prevailed and the presence of many who had not formerly allied themselves with the liberal party speak of the new feeling against the present Union administration.
