CHASED ACROSS A CREEK

BIG BEAR COMES INTO COLLISSION WITH THE POLICE.

WINNIPEG, June 7.—Lieut.-Gov. Aikens has received a message from Gen. Middle-ton's camp, near Fort Pitt, dated June 2, to the effect that Rev. Mr. and Mrs-Quinney, Mr. Cameron and two halfbreeds, who have been prisoners with Big Bear, escaped, and were now in Gen. Strange's camp, twelve miles from Fort Pitt. Mr. Quinney states that none of the women have suffered any indignities. Gen. Strange says that Big Bear's band has broken apart, virtually into two parties, and he has still the McLean families and

wounted men, and hopes to catch hig Bear
yet.

Mr. Cameron, one of the prisoners
rescued, gives the names of the Frog lake
murderers. He says the Wood Crees
saved the prisoners' lives, the Plain Crees
wanting to kill them. He states that Mrs.
Delaney and Mrs. Gowanlook have been
well treated. All the prisoners were
comparatively well treated, and no
indignities were offered them.

FORT PITT, N.W.T., June 3, via Battleford, June 6 .- Gen. Middleton with 50 men each of the 92th, Midland and Grena-diers and a Gatling left to join Gen. Strange this evening. All the mounted men left early this morning.

An Engagement With the Bear. FORT PITT, June 4.—Captain Steel with seventy mounted scouts and police had an engagement with Big Bear at Two Lakes miles southeast of here, yesterday He came upon the Indians as they were striking camp and immediately attacked them. Finding their front too strong he executed a clever flank movement, taking the Indians in the rear and driving them in disorder across a creek, where he was unable to follow on account of his small force. The Indians numbered fully 250. He saw no signs of the prisoners during the fight.

Capt. Steel sent an interpreter to McKee with a flag of truce. He advanced but was fired on. He got near enough to be heard and called out to Big Bear in Indian, who replied indistinctly. McKee said, "If you will deliver our people we will cease

to clean you out."

The two boys, who work at Webb's brickyard, went into Mr. Webb's house to get their week's salary, when Barge picked up a shot gun and pointing it at young Rosed, not thinking it was loaded, pulled the trigger. The contents struck Rosed on the left cheek, killing him instantly. When Barge saw what he had done he ran'all the way down to the police office and gave himself up.

Bryan, a farmer 35 years of age living about half a mile east of Garden Hill, was struck by lightning and instantly killed while standing in his own house. AFGHAN'S AMEER KILLED

HIS OWN CHIEFS.

Ayoub His Probable Successor—The Re-port Misbelleved at the English Wa^r Office—An Ovation to Gen. Lumsden. London, June 6.—The Novoeti (a Russian newspaper) announces that it has been privately informed from the Caucasus that the ameer of Afghanistan, Abdurrah man, had been assassinated by his suite. It is said that the murder took place in Persia, where the ameer was at the time traveling, and that Ayoub Khan, the deposed ameer, will be his successor. The port causes much excitement.

The Russian report that Abdurrahman, the ameer of Afghanistan, has been murdered by his suite, is not credited at the British foreign office. Couriers from Cabul arrive at the British posts on the Afghan frontier twice a week regularly. In the latest reports brought to the British agents at these posts there was no news of any actual disorder in Afghanistan, but the general situation in the ameer's dominions has been described in all recent reports as one betokening danger to Abdurrahman's authority. This has been attributed to the discontent among the tribal chiefs over the ameer's failure to distribute among them the sums of money which the chiefs believed he received from the Earl of Dufferin, vicercy of India, at the recent durbar at Rawal-Pindi, with which to subsidize the Afghan tribes. It would not be surprising if some of these disappointed chiefs should have resolved to adopt murder as revenge upon the ameer.
