Will the people of this city at last admit that there is more than empty suspicion in the talk of bribery? Will the people at last take an interest in the matter and demand that a prompt and cordial enquiry be undertaken? If a few pieces of pavement were laid on an important street the citizens would manifest their indignation in an unmistakable way. But here, when an eminently greater injustice appears to have been done than when in a transaction involving millions of dollars there was a hidden trap in the attitude of certain aldermen, when the indefatigable bribery received dignity by being formulated into a deliberate accusation by a man like J. K. Kerr, Q.C., and this was followed by strong affidavits by R. A. Macdonald, when a man of such irreproachable energy as Mr. Macdonald suddenly dropped the whole thing, notifying his collector that he had "received a consideration," there should have been a lively concern displayed. If anything short of a free confession could alarm the public, there should have been alarm and an united demand for a full investigation.

But the people smiled incredulously and the papers, with the exception of The World and Empire, were too impatient to ascertain the facts or to speculate on the possibility of the public, until now such evidence has accumulated and such facts have been dragged reluctantly into the light that no two opinions can longer exist—an investigation there does not demand or deferred.
