Preparations Were Being Made For Exhibition of National Interest.

Official intimation has been received at the local office of the department of agriculture of the cancellation of the Royal Winter Fair, which was to have been held at Toronto from November 17 to 25.

The preparations had been made for an exhibition of national scope and the reason for its cancellation is attributed to the fact that the directors of the fair declared that it would not be able to hold the fair, as the building they were to use would not be heated.
