No action had taken place on the part of the Assembly to indicate the views of the ministry on the report of M. Thiers, but there was a ratnor from Paris on Thursday, the difficulty between M. Thiers and the President had been satisfactorily adjusted. In the Assembly on the 15 h and 16th, the principle subject of debate was the annual dowry of 300 000 francs of the Duchess of Orleans.
