The Supreme Court of Canada was last week engaged in hearing the case submitted to it for a decision as to the relative powers of the dominion and local parliaments in dealing with both the regulation, and the prohibition, of the liquor traffic. This is a matter which has not yet been determined since these two bodies were created by the British North America Act. At the outset it was claimed that the power to regulate as well as to prohibit, was vested in the dominion parliament, and in accerdance with this claim the McCarthy Act was passed dealing with the matter. The province of Ontario, it will be remembered, contested this right, and in the end the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council upheld the claim of the province, declaring the McCarthy Act null and void. In the case now submitted it is being contended in behalf of the dominion government that the parliament of Canada, having control over all matters of trade and commerce, has power over the importation, manufacture, and wholesale branches of the trade, while the licensing and regulating of the retail trade only comes within the control of the local legislatures.
