King's County Board of Trade

The Kings County Board of Trade is one of the live organizations of the province. Every movement or cause promising to benefit the country as well as the county is sure of their hearty support. The cause which they are now endeavoring to promote, cooperation in apple shipping is one which should enlist the interest and attention of every fruit grower, and also the Valley boards of trade. They have called a mass meeting for Monday, May the fourth, which they invite all fruit growers to attend and have made arrangements with the D. A. R. for special rates. Among the subjects for discussion are the following:—

An Address by the President on Spraying.

A. S. Barnsted, Secretary of Immigration, will address the meeting on Hired Help Problems and how to secure good help in door and out.

Howard Bligh, who has just returned from watching the sales of apples in England, Canadian and American, will advise what class of fruit to grow and other important features.

Capt. C. O. Allen will tell the excessive duty on apples going to Germany. All Boards of Trade will be asked to endorse the resolution presented.

Prof. Cummings will speak on an interesting subject. Free discussion on all subjects. Public invited to attend.

Maritime Express Wrecked

Montreal, April 29.—The passengers by the Maritime Express from Halifax, which arrived here at three o'clock this morning, had an exciting adventure. The express, crowded with passengers and running at 30 miles an hour, ran into a ditch at St. Helen de Bagot, near St. Hyacinthe, but not one passenger or employee was even seriously injured.

There was no warning of the accident. The train, to all belief, was clear for the run to Montreal, and the engineer threw on full steam, and brought his train up to a clip of about thirty miles an hour. Without any warning the entire train, composed mostly of parlor cars and dining coaches, was thrown into the ditch. Not one car remained on the track, but glided through the soft mud and grass, going out great furrows for half a hundred feet.

Those in the coaches were unable to reach the doors or windows for several minutes after the accident, owing to the confusion, and expected that each moment would find the train in flames. Through the speed of the train was checked in less than half a minute through the derailment, none of the coaches telescoped to any great extent and the fact, with many others in connection with the wreck, is considered little short of miraculous.

Though all the passengers were thrown from their seats by the sudden halt of the rushing train, only one was put through any alarming experience. One of the porters in the dining car was thrown through a window into a pool of mud, and when dragged out by the rescue party of passengers was found half choked.

Observant Citizen Wants to Know What League is Doing.

To the Editor of the Monitor.—In your last issue of the Monitor you mentioned our defunct "League of Trade." Has our Law and Order League" also fallen by the wayside? Events that have happened since the formation of the League certainly do not reflect any credit on the town. Yet we see a dozen or more children playing on the main street every day during the hours they should be at school. Has the town youths recently arrested for theft spent more time in the school-room, they would probably be honestly employed today, instead of being behind the bars.

It might be said, perhaps, the Law and Order League does not recognize any other evil than that of selling liquor. Admitting this fact, it is still procurable, parties obtaining it, they say, from the drug stores, by prescription, but we understand the doctor can only give a prescription for from eight to ten ounces, at a time. A case of a doctor being fined twenty dollars for giving a prescription for a quart instead of the legal quantity, in the town of Digby, was recently brought to our notice.

We do not wish to accuse either doctors or druggists of violating the Scott Act for we are only going by hearsay as to where the goods were obtained, but the parties we refer to certainly had the goods on them and they were procured in the town.

What about the papers that were issued for the arrest of one of our citizens for a third offense. We understand that they were obliged to turn them, yet we have never heard of the citizen in question harming any man, woman or child. In other cases the law has to be carried out without fear or prejudice, why not in this case?

The Municipal Council Semi-Annual Session, April, 1908

Council met in the Court House at Bridgetown in the County of Annapolis on Tuesday, the 21st day of April, 1908, at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Present: The Wardens, Councillors—Oulitt, Charlton, Fitch, Foster, Bent, Armstrong, Porter, Rawling, Healy, Piggott, Bishop, Grimm, Thomas, Buehler, and Brown.

Minutes read and approved. Upon reading the petition of Alexander Turpie and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the county of Annapolis, asking that a Polling Booth be established in some convenient place at Pimney or Youngs Cove the same was deferred for further consideration.

Upon reading the petition of John and Benjamin Woodland and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County of Annapolis, praying for a winter sled road from Ritchie's Flat so called, at the mill site of Moschell to the south side of Big Swamp, a mile more or less.

Upon hearing Mr. Woodland, it was ordered that the prayer of said petition be granted and that commission be appointed to inquire into the propriety and necessity of opening said road and to perform such other duties as are prescribed by statute.

Thomas Spurr and Henry Buehler were appointed commissioners for this purpose.

Upon reading the petition of James E. Marshall and upwards of twenty others, rate-payers of the County of Annapolis, praying for the re-opening of the Messias Road, so called, running from Arlington to Star, Cross Cove, it was ordered that the same be considered in afternoon session.

Upon reading the report of the committee appointed to settle with the town of Annapolis and Bridgetown, it was ordered that the same be received and adopted. The following are the reports:

Programme for Quebec Ter-Centenary

London, April 19.—Arrangements have been completed for the visit which the Prince of Wales is to pay to Quebec in July to attend the tercentenary celebrations and inaugurate the dedicating of the Plains of Abraham to Wolfe and Montcalm, and to the men who fought under them for the possession of what is now a part of Canada.

This is the Prince's second visit to Canada. He crossed nearly ten years ago, when on his world tour, from ocean to ocean, visiting all the chief towns en route. He also spent some time enjoying the fishing and hunting of the northwest. This time, however, he will go no further than Quebec and his stay will not extend over a fortnight.

The Atlantic will be crossed on a fast cruiser, probably the Minotaur, accompanied by another fast cruiser as an escort, the two leaving Portsmouth on July 16th and reaching Quebec on the 22nd.

The British Atlantic fleet will go on in advance of the Minotaur and her escort to take part in the celebration and give a fitting welcome to the heir to the throne upon his arrival in Canadian waters. His royal highness will be accompanied by a brilliant staff; so that none of the pomp and ceremony of the British court will be missing. Among the staff will be Sir Francis Horwood, permanent under-secretary for the colonies, who of all men in England probably knows more about the colonies, and upon whom the Canadians at least rely when dealing with the Mother Country.

French and American squadrons will also be at Quebec, and invitations have been sent to France and all the colonies to send delegations to take part in the celebrations. Australia has accepted and will be represented by Lord Dudley, the new governor general of the commonwealth. Brongens in the Charente Inférieure, the birthplace of the explorer, Champlain, has been asked to send a representative as have also the families of Generals Wolfe and Montcalm, Lord J. Murray, Guy Carleton and Simon Fraser, who performed deeds of valor in the taking of Quebec.

The Prince on landing July 22nd will be received by the Governor general and will be presented with an address by the Dominion parliament. On the 23rd the scene of the landing of Champlain will be performed and the old navy will be shown with the crew in replica of his ship. The fetes will then be formally opened by the Prince, to which Sir Wilfrid Laurier will reply. The program of the following days follows:

July 24.—Dedication of the battle-field. Military and naval review.

July 25.—Review of the fleets.

July 26.—Thanksgiving day. Services in the Roman Catholic and English cathedrals.

July 27.—Naval display ashore by 10,000 sailors. Representative of the bombardment of Quebec by the British fleet and army under Saunders and Wolfe.

July 28.—Princes of Wales leaves Quebec.

Quebec, April 18.—Preparations for the big tercentenary celebration are going on apace, and good regular drill will commence on the big reguency performances. Frank Lascelles in discussing today the progress made said that taking into consideration the unrivaled situation of Quebec, that there was no reason why the Quebec regent of 1908 should not prove the very finest thing of its kind ever seen in the world's history. It transpired today that the costumes are well under way and are being especially manufactured in England. The fireworks will be unique and probably the finest in the world's history. A series of ninety inch bombs are being especially manufactured in London. These pieces will be the most spectacular ever seen and each one after exploding will hurl a shower of 3,000 colored lights. The roar of the bursting bomb will be heard thirty miles distant. Special apparatus is being constructed to throw these bombs in the air.
