Ozoni. Dr. Lender ozonises chambers ver successfully by means of a mixture of the protoxid of manganese, or of the permanganate of potasi and oxalic acid. Two spoonfuls of this powder moistened with twice the amount of water, and trifle more of water every two hours, emits 0200 treely. Gold and silver, however, excepted, it or idises metals rapidly. ON THE PROPERTIES OF MUSCARINE.-M. Pro vost directed the notice of the Societe de Biologia 18th April, to some physiological properties of mu carine, the alkaloid or glucoside of Ammania muscaria. It is a very violent poison. It arrest the heart in diastole, unlike digitaline, which arres it in systole. Schmiedeberg indicated its antaonism with atropine. Muscarine increases the flo of saliva, directly exciting the salivary glands. excites the lachrymal glands, also promoting the flow of tears. Atropine will check the salivatly induced by muscarine.

TREATMENT OF TYPHOID FEVER.—Dr. Compa finding it difficult to reconcile patients and the friends with the practice of cold immersion in feve had recourse to the pardonable artifice of adding a few drops of phenic acid to the water before hand. This premised, he practised aspersion over the entire surface with the utmost advantage, the lowering the fever, and inducing such relief that the sufferer himself was anxious for its repetition in few hours. The patient and his friends ascribed the relief to the phenic acid, and the practitioner ha the satisfaction of securing the great advantages cold aspersion without running counter to their pre judices.—L' Union Medicale.
