THE COPP, CLARK CO., LIMITED.

A new book, by Florence Kingsley, author of "Titus," is promised soon. Its title is "The Prisoners of the Sea," and it deals with the Huguenots and the Man in the Iron Mask. It will be ready for the trade about Nov. 15.

Another new Canadian edition, paper, 75c., and cloth, \$1.25, ready by the end of November, is "The Pride of Jennico," by Agnes and Egerton Castle.

"Spanish John," by Wm. McLellan, will be issued by this firm in January. "A Fountain Sealed," Sir Walter Besant's latest novel, is one of the new books on the market.

Among the Copp, Clark Co.'s books that are good sellers at present may be mentioned: Robert Louis Stevenson's "St. Ives," which is reviewed elsewhere, and is one of the finest adventure stories of Scotland during the Napoleonic wars that has ever appeared; Davis' "Soldiers of Fortune;" "The Two Captains;" Mrs. Walford's "Iva Kildare," reviewed elsewhere; Crawford's "Corleone," and Blackmore's "Dariel." Of the latter it should be said that Mr. Blackmore is one of the few writers of high rank who do not crowd the market with annual or semi-annual volumes. It is three years since "Perlycross" was published, and since then, except in writing some sketches, the author has been wholly devoted to this, his new long romance.

It is pleasing to hear that there is still a large Canadian demand for Gilbert Parker's "Seats of the Mighty." It appeared over a year ago, and is now in the sixth edition.

AN EDITION OF NANSEN.

Perhaps the nicest edition of Nansen's "Farthest North" is one which is being issued by George Newnes & Co., and for which the Montreal News Co. is agent. The book is a reproduction of the original English edition, plates and all. It is issued fortnightly in parts, which are printed on the best of paper, with fine illustration. The parts retail for 20c. each, making the work complete for \$4. The original English edition cost \$12. The first part is already issued.

BEAUTIFUL JOE.

The fifth Canadian edition of this famous and popular book, which has interested humanitarians the world over and of which over 200,000 copies have been sold, is now ready. The edition contains a prefatory note in fac-simile written by the Countess of

Aberdeen and an autobiography of the authoress, Marshall Saunders. It is handsomely illustrated, contains 304 pages and is sold in paper at 30c. and in cloth at 75c.

THE NOVEMBER MAGAZINES.

THE Canadian has the best cover in its career—paper of pale blue tint, with gilt printing. The programme of articles is admirable. Dr. Bourinot's first paper on the "Makers of Canada," deals with the early discoverers, and is accompanied by several illustrations. Mr. Willison, the editor of The Toronto Globe, writes on the Premiers of Ontario—Sandfield Macdonald, Blake, Mowat and Hardy. His sketches are vivid and powerful, and the whole subject is dealt with in a masterly manner. The article is one which, from the biographical and political data alone, no student of public events will care to be without. It should be brought to the attention of those interested in politics. Mr. Cooper, the editor, contributes a most readable historical paper on the Fenian Raid of 1866 along the Niagara border. The article is well done, and the illustrations most interesting. There are several good stories, and the literary reviews are up to date.

The Citizen (Philadelphia, \$1 a year) contains a criticism of Bliss Carman's new volume of verse "Ballads of Lost Haven." Several extracts are given.

Some of the attractive items in The Century's list are: "Andree's Flight into the Unknown," "Greater New York" (with colored map), and the story of the heroic defence of Chitral by the British forces under Sir George Robertson, who was in Canada a few weeks ago.

The Hesperian, the western quarterly magazine (A. N. de Menil, St. Louis, Mo.; 50c. a year) contains a hostile view of British control in Egypt and the Soudan, and a biographical and critical article on Jean Ingelow.

The monthly number of The Toronto Westminster is especially good. Ralph Connor concludes his Tales from the Selkirks. Principal Grant begins a series entitled "The British Empire To-day and To-morrow," accompanied by portraits of leading men. All the Sunday, children's,

home and other departments are well sustained.

Outing has a readable paper on "Dogs" by E. W. Sandys, and a fine account of moose hunting in Canada by Dr. Syms.
