such as that the company shall not have power to expropriate against the consent of the owner, and generally speaking, what are known as the standard clauses.

Bill reported, read the third time, and passed.

### CAMPBELLFORD, LAKE ONTARIO AND WESTERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

House in Committee on Bill No. 41, respecting the Campbellford, Lake Ontario and Western Railway Company.-Mr. Smith.

On section 1—issue of securities:

Mr. LANCASTER: In this Bill the standard clauses are also added, and we have increased the capital.

Mr. OLIVER: The bonding privileges allowed on this road seem very large. assume the committee has some definite rule in regard to granting permission to impose liabilities upon a road?

Mr. LANCASTER: In one of their Acts they had power up to \$25,000 a mile on part of the line and another Act gave them \$35,000 a mile. They constructed part of the road and found they could not possibly build it for less than the sum which is now allowed them. The Railway Committee were satisfied on the explanation given that the company should have that additional amount.

Bill reported, read the third time, and passed.

# MANITOBA AND NORTH WESTERN RAILWAY COMPANY.

House in committee on Bill No. 44, respecting the Manitoba and North Western Railway Company of Canada.-Mr. Cash.
