Mr. L. T. Pennell (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Finance): As indicated in the letter from the Prime Minister to provincial premiers which was printed in the appendix to *Hansard* on April 20, 1964, and in the white paper which was tabled by the Minister of National Health and Welfare on August 10, 1964, the funds arising from the pension plan are to be made available for the use of the provinces and the provincial governments would be required to undertake to pay interest to the pension fund at a rate of interest at least equal to the rate on long term federal securities.

Apart from this general statement, this question relates to a matter of government policy on which an announcement will be made by the government at the appropriate time.

(a) Includes agriculture, forestry, fishing and trapping, mining and quarrying, manufacturing and construction.

(b) Includes transportation and communication, public utilities, trade, finance, service (comprising community service, government service, recreational service, business service and personal service).
