Notwithstanding Paragraph C, no station, network, operator or pay television licensee shall broadcast any abusive comment or abusive pictoral representation on any race, religion, creed or sex.

MR. YOUNG-SAFE DRINKING WATER

Mr. Neil Young (Beaches): Madam Speaker, it is my honour and privilege to present a petition signed by a number of residents of Ontario who humbly show that toxic chemicals are posing an increasing threat to the potable waters of that Province. There is presently no legislation which will guarantee the safety and healthfulness of those waters, and Canada's neighbour, the United States of America, has legislation entitled the Safe Drinking Water Act, 1974.

Wherefore we the undersigned humbly pray and call upon Parliament to enact a safe drinking water Act which would protect and enhance drinking water quality in all areas of Canada.

MR. ANGUISH-NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT

Mr. Doug Anguish (The Battlefords-Meadow Lake): Madam Speaker, I have three different petitions to present to the House of Commons this afternoon. Each of these petitions originated with the Winnipeg Co-ordinating Committee for Disarmament, and they were sent to the Parliament Hill peace camp which approached me to present them to the House.

The first petition is signed by 1,156 residents of Manitoba who fear an escalation of the nuclear arms race and call upon Parliament to support the minority report on security and disarmament, and to refuse to allow testing of the Cruise missile in Canada.

The second petition argues that the nuclear arms race could end in a nuclear holocaust, and it urges Parliament to press for an early signing of a strategic arms limitation treaty and actively support the convening of a European conference on military detente and disarmament in Europe.

Finally, Madam Speaker, it is with a great deal of pleasure that I present a petition signed by citizens of the United States of America who live near the Grand Forks airforce base in North Dakota, and in Minnesota, who are working for a nuclear freeze and the stopping of all testing and deployment of the Cruise missile. The petition is sent to the Parliament of Canada as a form of international support for Canadian opposition to the Cruise.

I think, Madam Speaker, these petitions are particularly relevant at the present time because of the Korean airlines incident and the fragile tinderbox we seem to be living in at the present time.
