## TRANSPORT

ANALYSIS OF AMENDMENTS TO CROWSNEST PASS RATE
ACCEPTED BY GOVERNMENT

Mr. Gaston Gourde (Lévis): Mr. Speaker, I think it would be useful to let Canadians know to what extent the present Liberal Government has been analyzing proposed changes to the Crow Rate. Before Bill C-155 was tabled in the House last May, a number of consultations and meetings with the people concerned had already been held. At the second reading stage, 97 Members were given nine days to consider legislation, and they did so for 44 hours. In committee, the Bill required 31 days of work, 11 being used to travel across Canada in order to meet concerned citizens. The Committee heard 240 witnesses and 89 amendments were adopted in committee. Until last week's sitting, and we should include today's as well, about 200 speeches had been made at the report stage in the House. Opposition Members are being excessively touchy about their democratic rights when they claim that the Government is not giving them an opportunity to be heard. Canadians are prepared to have these changes adopted immediately, and I hope this will be done as soon as possible.

JUSTIFICATION FOR UNITED STATES INVASION OF GRENADA

## DISARMAMENT

CALL FOR SUPPORT OF PRIME MINISTER'S INITIATIVE

Mr. John Evans (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council): Mr. Speaker, there can be no greater need for action in this time of international instability than the need for action to bring about a lasting and secure peace. In this Disarmament Week, Mr. Speaker, I call upon Hon. Members, and indeed upon all Canadians, to support the efforts of the Right Hon. Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau) to rally world leaders around new and creative initiatives—

Mr. Nielsen: Where is the apple?

Mr. Evans: —toward effective arms reductions. The initiative of the Prime Minister is an act of personal courage and a continuation of—

An Hon. Member: No more Cabinet shuffles this year.

Mr. Evans: —Liberal Government diplomatic initiatives in the decades since the Second World War when Lester B. Pearson announced Canada's approach to nuclear war. He stated that there is no national solution, only an international solution. The Prime Minister, Mr. Speaker, is continuing the quest for a lasting international solution.

This effort is not, as the Hon. Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Mulroney) would have us believe, simply "philosophical musing".

An Hon. Member: I believe that.

Mr. Evans: Rather than attempting to gain partisan political advantage by undermining the effectiveness of the Prime Minister's bold initiative, the Official Opposition should put aside their partisan rhetoric in an effort to further the cause of peace. There are no second chances, Mr. Speaker.

An Hon. Member: Oh, John!
