CSC—NORTHERN PSYCHIATRIC TREATMENT CENTRE

Question No. 268—Mr. Kaplan:

1. Has the government conducted any studies, on its own or in conjunction with the government of Ontario, into the impact on Sault Ste. Marie of locating the Northern Psychiatric Treatment Centre within the city limits of that community?

2. Did the Correctional Service of Canada (C.S.C.) select the particular site in Sault Ste. Marie for the construction of the Northern Psychiatric Treatment Centre and, if not, did the C.S.C. or any other branch of the government object to the construction of the Centre in close proximity to a public school and a residential area of Sault Ste. Marie?

3. Does the Northern Treatment Centre Agreement entered into by the Correctional Services of Canada and the Ontario Ministry of Corrections provide (a) for the future construction of additional correctional institutions in the Sault Ste. Marie area (b) for the citizens of Sault Ste. Marie to become directly involved in the treatment and re-integration into the community of the Centre's inmates?

Order Paper Questions

4. Will copies of the Northern Treatment Centre Agreement be released to the public and, if so, on what date?

Hon. James Kelleher (Solicitor General of Canada): In so far as the Correctional Service of Canada is concerned:

1. The cost of establishing and maintaining the Northern Treatment Centre will be shared by the federal and provincial correctional services. However, the Centre will be constructed and managed by the provincial Government. Therefore, the establishment of the Centre, including site issues, is the responsibility of the provincial Government who, since the beginning, has been making various decisions concerning the Centre in accordance with its normal practices and policies.

Consequently, no federal impact studies have been conducted, nor has the federal Government participated in any provincial studies related to the Northern Treatment Centre.

2. The Correctional Service of Canada did not select the particular site for the Northern Treatment Centre. Given the security safeguards provided by the Centre design, the Correctional Service of Canada does not consider there is any need to object to the site selected.

3. (a) The Northern Treatment Centre Agreement does not speak to future construction of additional correctional institutions in the Sault Ste. Marie area.

(b) The Northern Treatment Centre Agreement does not speak to the question of community involvement. Since the operation of the Centre will be managed by the provincial government, requests for specific details on the provincial policy on volunteer programs should be directed to the Ontario Ministry of Correctional Services. Generally speaking, however, the federal and provincial correctional systems encourage the involvement of the community on a volunteer basis.

4. Copies of federal-provincial agreements are not available until all formalities have been concluded. It is anticipated that these formalities will be concluded in the near future.

CENTENNIAL FLAME

Question No. 282—Mr. Boyer:

1. Are the coins in the Centennial Flame fountain retrieved by employees of the government and, if so, what is their average yearly value?

2. Has the government any plans to rebuild the present structure of the Centennial Flame, originally intended to be temporary, or to replace it with a new one?

Hon. Stewart McInnes (Minister of Public Works): 1. The coins in the Centennial Flame fountain are retrieved by an employee of Public Works Canada. They are counted, weighed and given to the Finance Branch of Public Works to be deposited in a bank account in the name of the Government. These funds are donated annually to charity as designated by Secretary of State.

The amounts retrieved yearly are in the order of \$1,000.
