

the aim of the General Council of the Bar to raise the standards of the profession and in particular to improve the level of the general and legal education of candidates for admission to its ranks, and in consequence approves in principle the proposals a) to require a university degree from all candidates for admission to study; b) to increase the minimum time in which a student may be admitted to the Bar to four years to be divided between university and office training.

It should be remembered, however, that a candidate's attainments under whatever system he is trained are not to be judged by the length of his preparation whether measured in years or in hours spent in the classroom or in the office, but by the quality and quantity of the work done
