himself there, and support and arm the Loyalists, which were the objects of his march into the heart of that province."

From Lord Cornwallis's former letters, I had every reason to suppose he thought himfelf in fufficient strength to command the fuccess he hoped for. Had his Lordship, however, upon Lieutenant-colonel Tarleton's misfortune, called upon me for a reinforcement, or had I even known it in time, I am perfuaded your Lordship will do me the justice to acknowledge, that it was absolutely out of my power to affift him more than I did; especially when it is confidered, that at this moment his Lordship has acting with him, and in the different posts under his command, nineteen British, eight German, and fourteen Provincial battalions, besides detachments from four British battalions, and Iagers, artillery and cavalry; whilst in my present threatened situation, I have (through my earnest desire to **fupport**
