

LAURIER WILL ADDRESS MEETING AT HAMILTON

Sir Wilfrid To Include the Ambitious City in His Campaign Itinerary.

HAMILTON, Aug. 3.—(Special.)—Considerable criticism is being expressed here of the small donation of \$25 made by the provincial government to the Hamilton free department in recognition of the services rendered by the department in Tuesday morning's fire at the asylum. It is generally felt that the grant is wholly incommensurate with the work done by the city's fire fighters.

Members of the local organization of the Liberal party this morning announced that Sir Wilfrid Laurier would include this city in the itinerary of his campaign. It is not definitely known, however, when the premier will speak here.

The local branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association has declared against the summer carnival which it had been proposed to hold in this city in 1912. The reason given is that such an affair would have an injurious effect on the manufacturers.

The board of control this morning declined to entertain the Corinthian football team when it visits this city next week. A grant to the Temple Salvation Army band of Toronto which was proposed to visit Hamilton, was also refused.

Two special C. P. R. trains containing 100 harvesters left Hamilton this morning. At Toronto the men will be again the extension to the western harvest fields.

The tug Laura Nickler passed the dock and apparently stirred the body up. It was removed to Simpson's morgue and the funeral took place at 6.30 to-night.

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PUBLIC AMUSEMENTS

Then other big military events, Lord Kitchener at Khartoum, Reviewing the Army and Changing the Guard at St. James.

LOOKS FOR AN 18-MILL RATE.

D. D. Reid Figures Out a Pretty Attractive Plan.

"What about the mill rate for North Toronto?" said The World to D. D. Reid, over the telephone last night. "Last Monday night," said Mr. Reid, "the finance committee were astonished beyond measure to find that the clerk and treasurer had prepared before us a compilation of figures to show the rates would be 21 1/2 mills on the dollar. We immediately threw out our coats, pared, sliced and dished at the estimates for three or four hours, till finally we struck a 20 mill rate.

"Considering the installation of sewerage, electric lighting and a high school, all seemed highly elated excepting myself. During the last year or two, when advocating sewerage and the general rate raising, I repeatedly wrote letters to the press quoting numerous figures to show that all the above mentioned improvements would be provided and still maintain an 18-mill rate. Consequently I felt very much disappointed at a 20-mill rate.

"And do you really mean to say now that the rates can still be reduced to 18 mills with all these utilities provided for?"

"Most decidedly I do. I will not give you exact figures, but in round numbers, the sewerage bylaw calls for \$255,000, the interest and sinking fund is \$16,000 per annum; the interest is 4 1/2 per cent, payable every six months; the sinking fund is payable at the end of each year; the debentures were advertised for sale and to date from Aug. 1, 1911. This date was fixed when I was in the hospital, or I could have persisted in having it Oct. 29, 1911, the date our taxes become payable.

"We have borrowed \$100,000 to meet the payments, and the sewerage works with the sewerage and electric lighting. About one-half of this amount has been paid out. The interest on the above until the date of sale would be about \$250—that is, until Aug. 1, 1911.

"Now we must provide for five months' interest for this year, but as probably only \$150,000 of the \$255,000 will be used this year, we will receive enough interest on the balance to meet at least one month's interest; consequently, all this year's taxes should be called on to pay for four months' interest, or one-third of the \$16,000, or \$5333. But granting that the debentures are sold to date from Aug. 1, the first instalment of interest becomes due on Feb. 1, 1912. Therefore \$6000, instead of \$5333, should be provided for this year, which takes 1 1/2 mills.

"The next payment would come due Aug. 1, 1912, and would be \$6000 interest, plus \$4000 sinking fund, making \$10,000. The committee, clerk and treasurer claim that we must add 1 1/2 mills this year to pay this \$10,000, and actually one year hence, and put this \$10,000 in the bank at 3 per cent interest while we are paying 4 1/2 per cent on the debentures."

"What excuse do they give for collecting this money this year to pay the money a year hence?"

"Because the bank will not loan the \$10,000 for three months until Oct. 30, when the taxes are payable."

"That's absurd; if one bank will not the \$10,000, surely another will."

"Most decidedly. Besides, there are dozens of men in the town who would give security for the three months if necessary, for everyone knows that the taxes are as sure as death, so there is no risk."

"Then you infer that 1 1/2 mills instead of the four would cover this year's interest?"

"Yes," said Mr. Reid. "It more than covers it, but I would not call it 1 1/2 mills and thus have our rate at 18 mills. Besides, this same rate applies to the \$20,000 of electric lighting, which would reduce the rates another quarter of a mill.

An 18-mill rate provides for the first instalment of interest for 1912, leaving a balance of \$2000 to apply on the \$10,000, coming due Aug. 1, 1912. Consequently, all that would be required for the next year's taxes are three months until next year's taxes are due," said the chairman of the water, fire and light committee.
