

McCree, killed, was the famous Scottish scocer player and a member of the Queen's Park Club of the Scottish League. Major W. N. Cowie, D.S.O. wounded, was the well known Loretto Rugby half-back, who played in the freshmen's match at Oxford in 1912. Lieut. R. M. Davies, wounded, is the famous Lampeter athlete and footballer. He got his athletic "blue" at Cambridge, winning the hurdles against Oxford in 1914. Captain H. K. Ward, wounded, is the famous Sydney University oarsman. 
